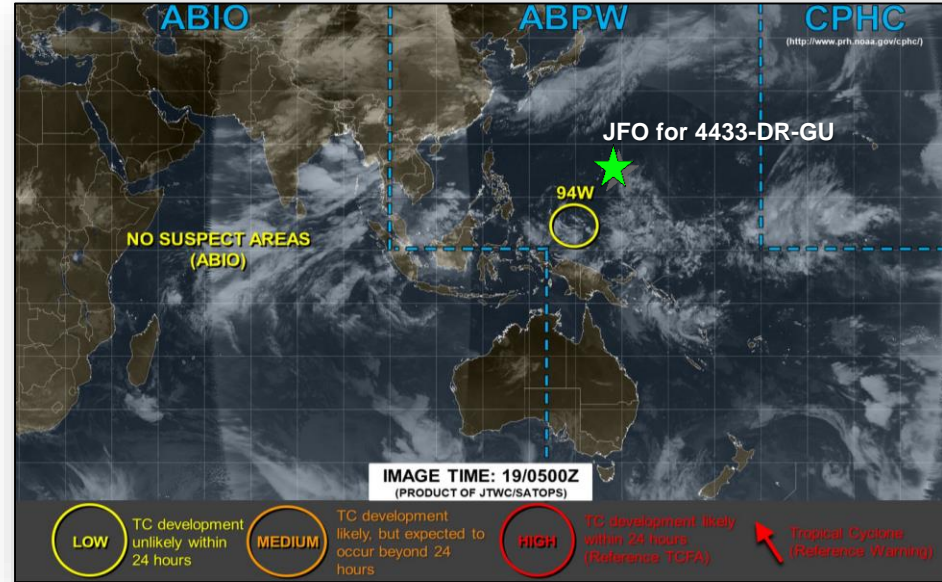

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U.S. Army Corps of Engineers / ESF #3: (as of 4:00 a.m. EDT)

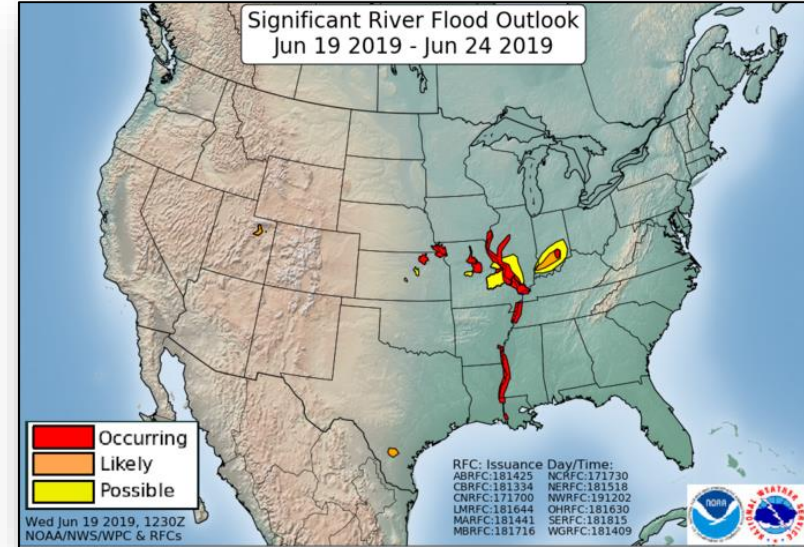
- No imminent threat of USACE-managed levees overtopping or breaching in the next operational period
- Continues to work with the impacted states; monitoring levees and providing operational support
- Overall improvement across all impacted USACE Divisions
- USACE-managed reservoirs are under control
- The Morganza Spillway opening postponed indefinitely

ESF #6: (as of 6:30 a.m. EDT)

- 5 shelters open with 19 occupants across all impacted areas
- Shelter numbers trending down

National Guard: (as of 6:30 a.m. EDT)

- 240 Soldiers and Airmen from the IL and KS NG supporting sandbagging operations, and levee monitoring
- Nebraska NG providing equipment for bulk potable water production

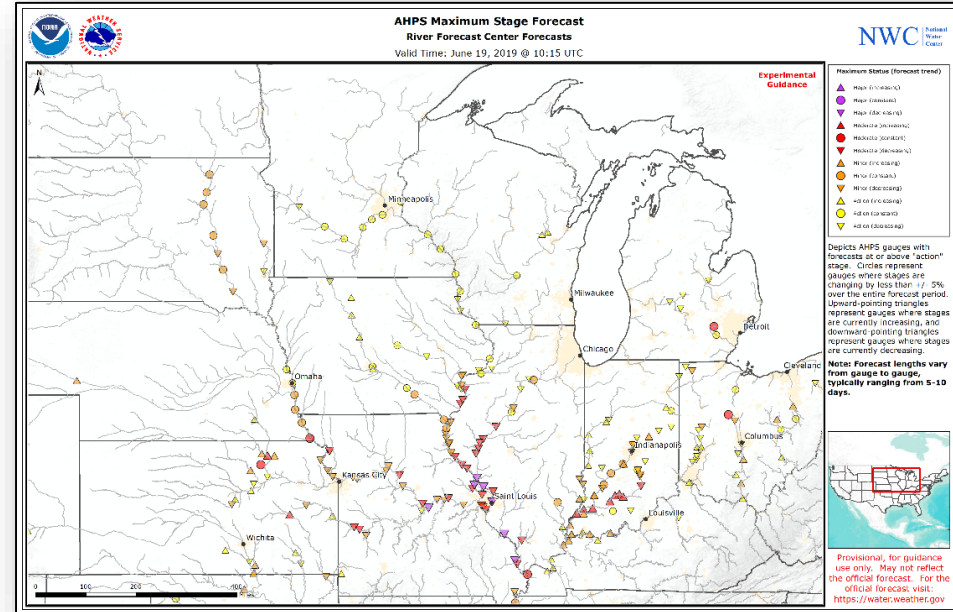


Upper Mississippi – River Forecast



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- The Upper Mainstem Mississippi, Missouri, and Illinois Rivers continue to fall
- Although river stages are falling, **Moderate to Major** flooding continues
- Rainfall of 1 to 3” over next 7 days is not expected to cause significant river impacts
- Flooding is expected to continue into July

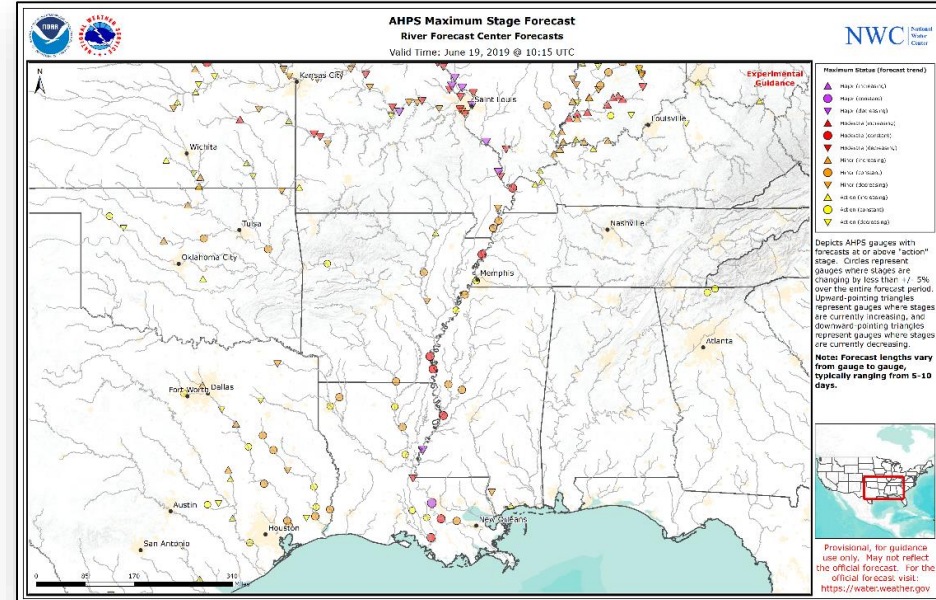


Lower Mississippi – River Forecast



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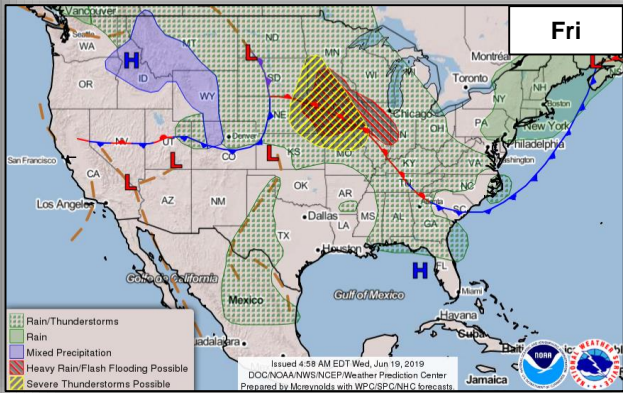
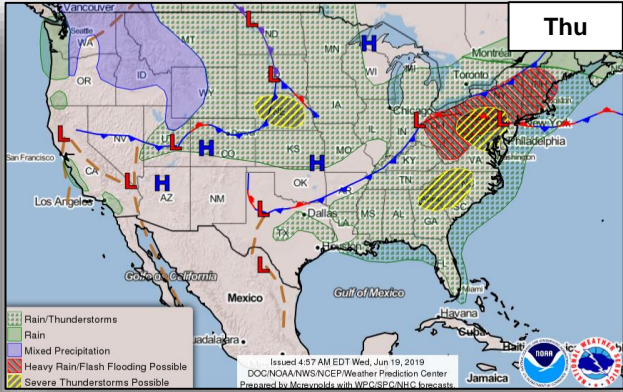
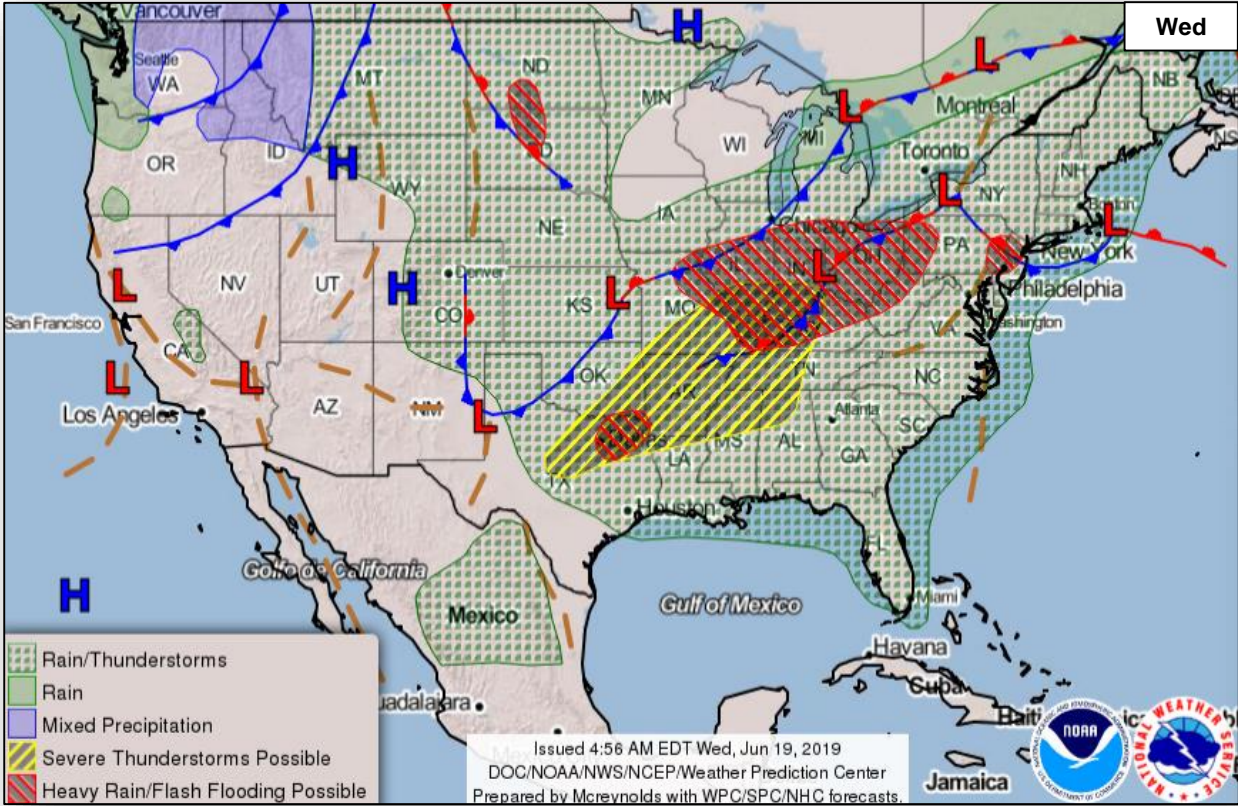
- The Lower Mississippi River is cresting from Memphis, TN downstream to Helena, AR and at Red River Landing, LA. Falls are expected over the next several days and rainfall over the Ohio Valley may cause additional rises for next week.
- By the end of the week, **Major** flooding will end for Thebes, IL, Vicksburg, MS, & Natchez, MS. Major flooding will continue at Cape Girardeau, MO and Baton Rouge, LA. **Impacts are primarily to navigation and agriculture.**
- Recent heavy rains over the Ohio and Tennessee valleys could renew rises and lead to new minor flooding in the coming week
- **Elevated levels will continue through June and well into July along the Lower Mississippi River**

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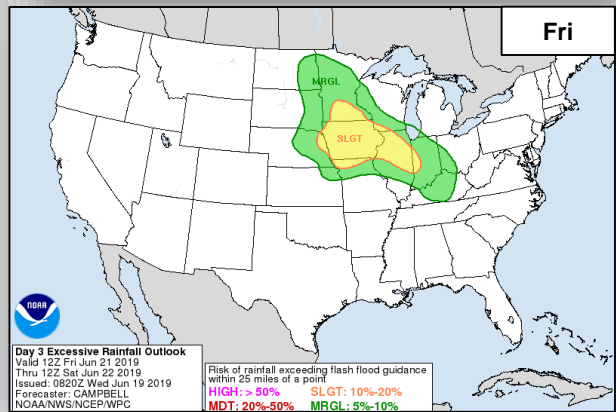
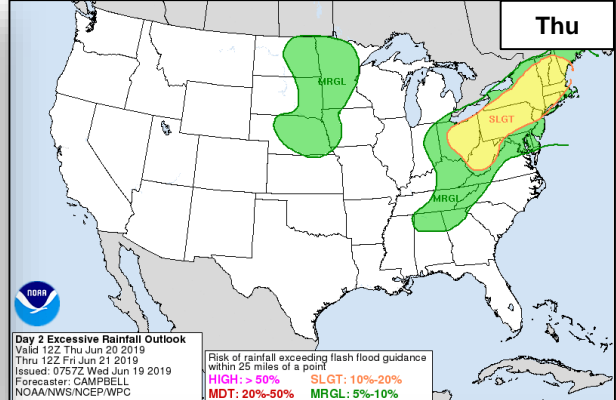
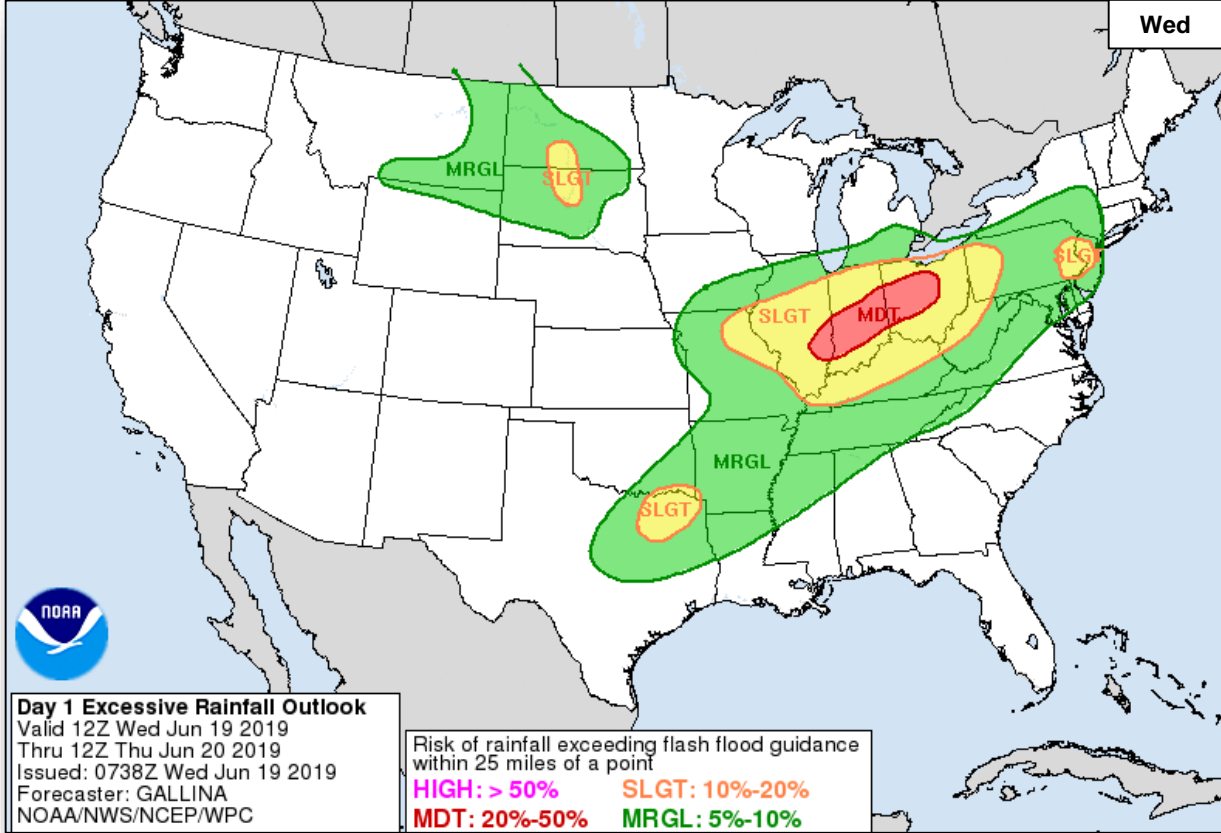

Excessive Rainfall Outlook



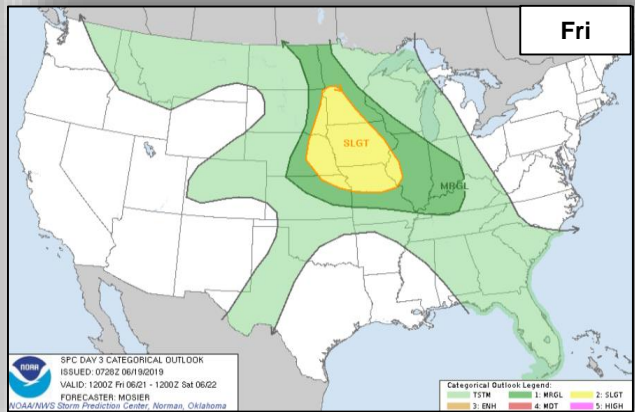
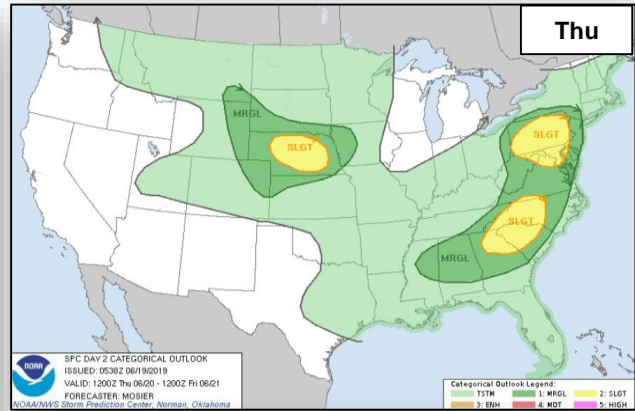
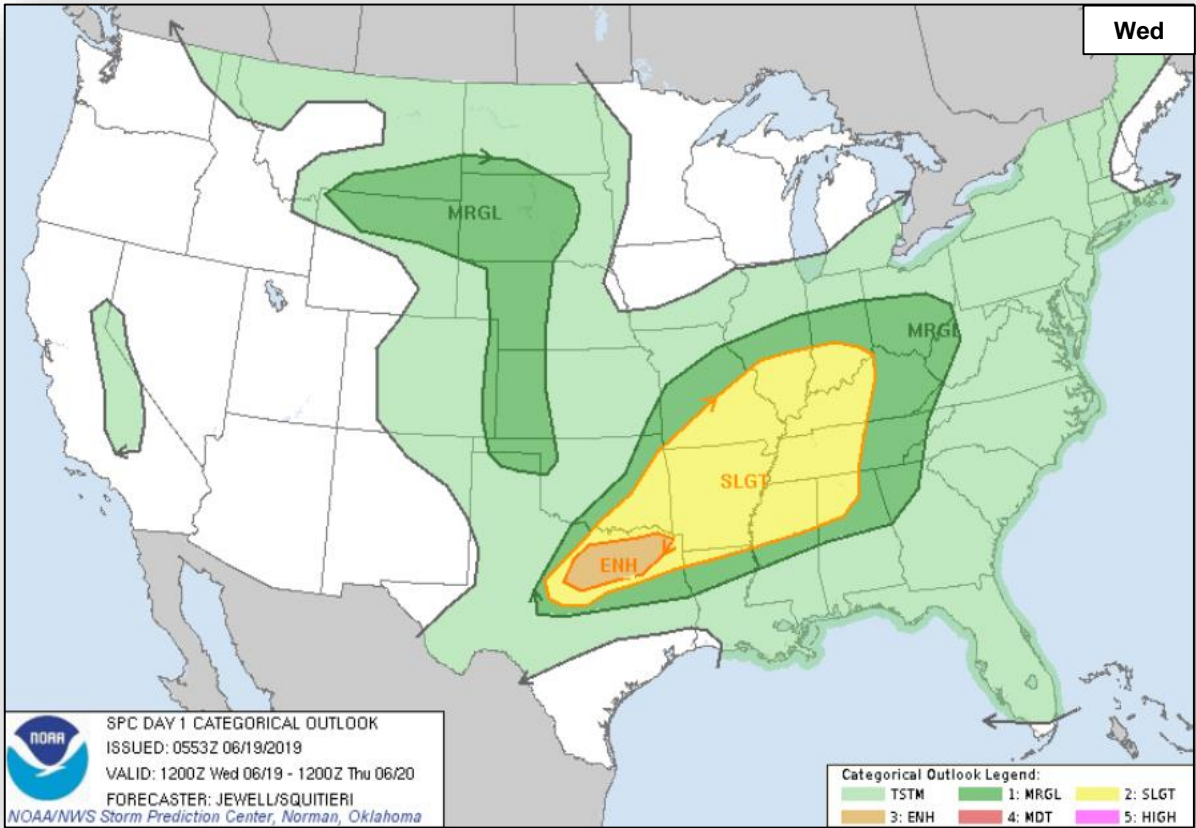
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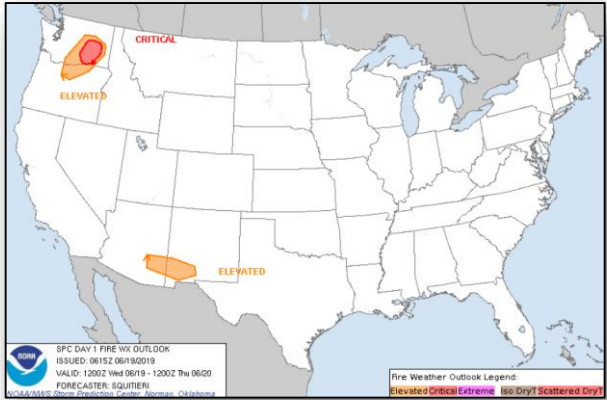

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FEMA-4447-DR-OH

- The President approved a Major Disaster Declaration (FEMA-4447-DR) on June 18, 2019
- For Severe Storms, Straight-line Winds, Tornadoes, Flooding, and Landslides that occurred May 27-29, 2019
- Provides:
 - Individual Assistance for 10 counties
 - Hazard Mitigation statewide

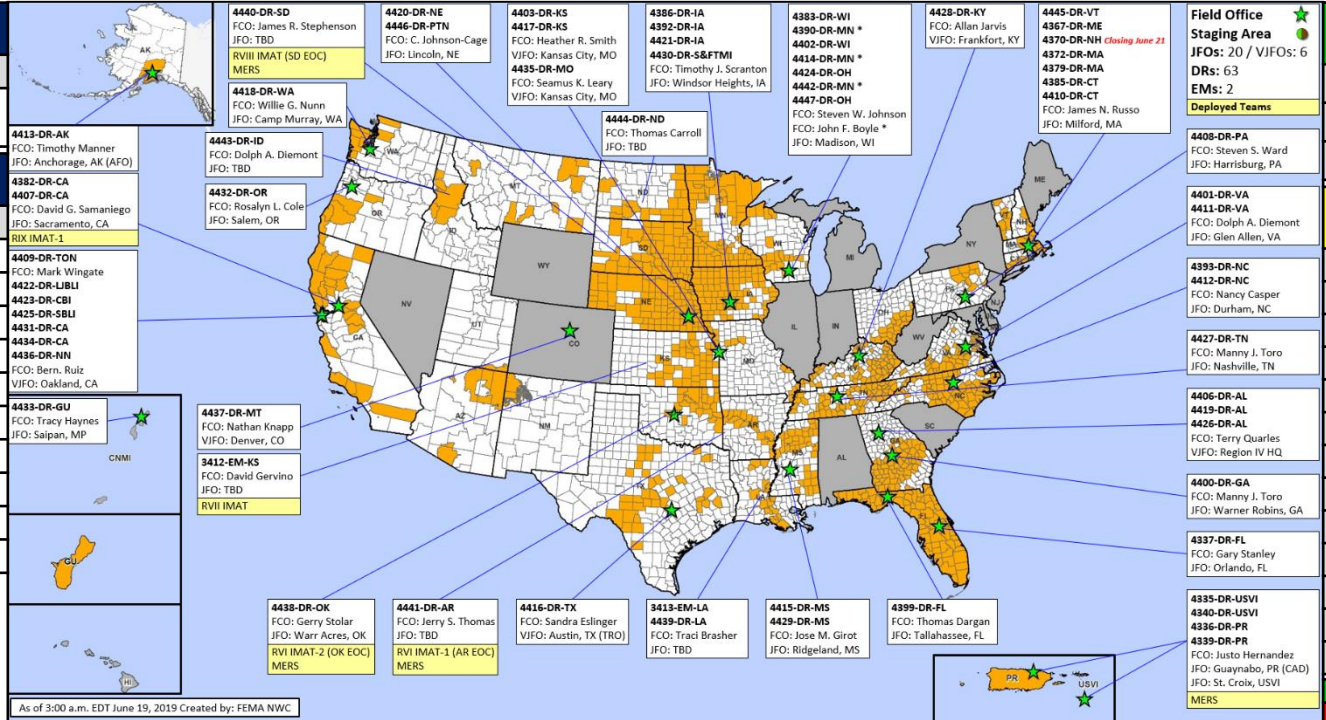
