Heavy Rain / Flooding - California

<u>Situation:</u> The cumulative effect of successive heavy rain events will lead to additional considerable flood impacts, including rapid water rises and mudslides, over northern and central California, and portions of far western Nevada. Minor to isolated major river flooding is expected through next week, with record high river levels possible. Readiness efforts are being ramped up with the establishment of a

joint interagency state and federal contingency planning group.

Evacuations issued for Santa Cruz county for 10 residents; all evacuations orders have been lifted for Los Angeles and

 The Manchester Band of Pomo requested bottled water and fuel wood delivery for two weeks, currently being met by state



- 28 (+2) county EOCs activated
- Tuolumne Band of Mi-Wuk Indians declared State of Emergency
- Gov: Declared State of Emergency; CA NG authorized to use high water vehicles
 - Activated the State Operations Center and Flood Operation Center for the city of Sacramento

FEMA / Federal Response:

- National Watch and FEMA Region IX will continue to monitor



National Weather Forecast






Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall






Snowfall Forecast







