




National Weather Forecast






Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall






Severe Weather Outlook





Hazards Outlook - Jan 27-31









INCIDENT SUMMARY

A weather system began in Vermont on July 7th and merged with follow on systems through July 16th. The excessive rainfall and flooding impacted all 14 counties of the state and forced the state government to evacuate from Montpelier, the state capital and forced the SEOC to relocate to an alternate site. The Governor requested an EM on July 9th which was approved as EM3595VT on July 10th. The Governor further requested an Expedited Major Disaster Declaration on July 13th, which was approved as on July 14th for Cat B for 14 counties and IA for 6 counties, later amended 7 times resulting in 9 counties for IA and 12 counties for PA A-G.




