




National Weather Forecast






Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall






Snowfall Forecast

INCIDENT SUMMARY

On August 30, 2023, Hurricane Idalia made landfall in the Big Bend region of Florida as a Category 3. Idalia caused significant flooding and tornado damage to homes, businesses, and infrastructure. There were 12 confirmed tornadoes and record-breaking storm surge from the Big Bend region south to Tampa Bay. The President declared a major disaster on August 31, 2023, designating seven counties for Individual Assistance and Hazard Mitigation statewide. Subsequently, additional counties were designated for Individual Assistance and Public Assistance.



- Disaster Housing Implementation Team (DHIT) led by Operations Section Chief with extensive Direct Housing experience
- Technical Monitors assisted park owners with government contract eligibility
- First household licensed in within 39 days
- All applicants were licensed in by 01/23/2024 (126 days)

Economic: Sustainable, diversified and resilient economy

Outcome Indicator (E1): Business activities are resumed and restored, including those local and marginalized businesses and major employers
