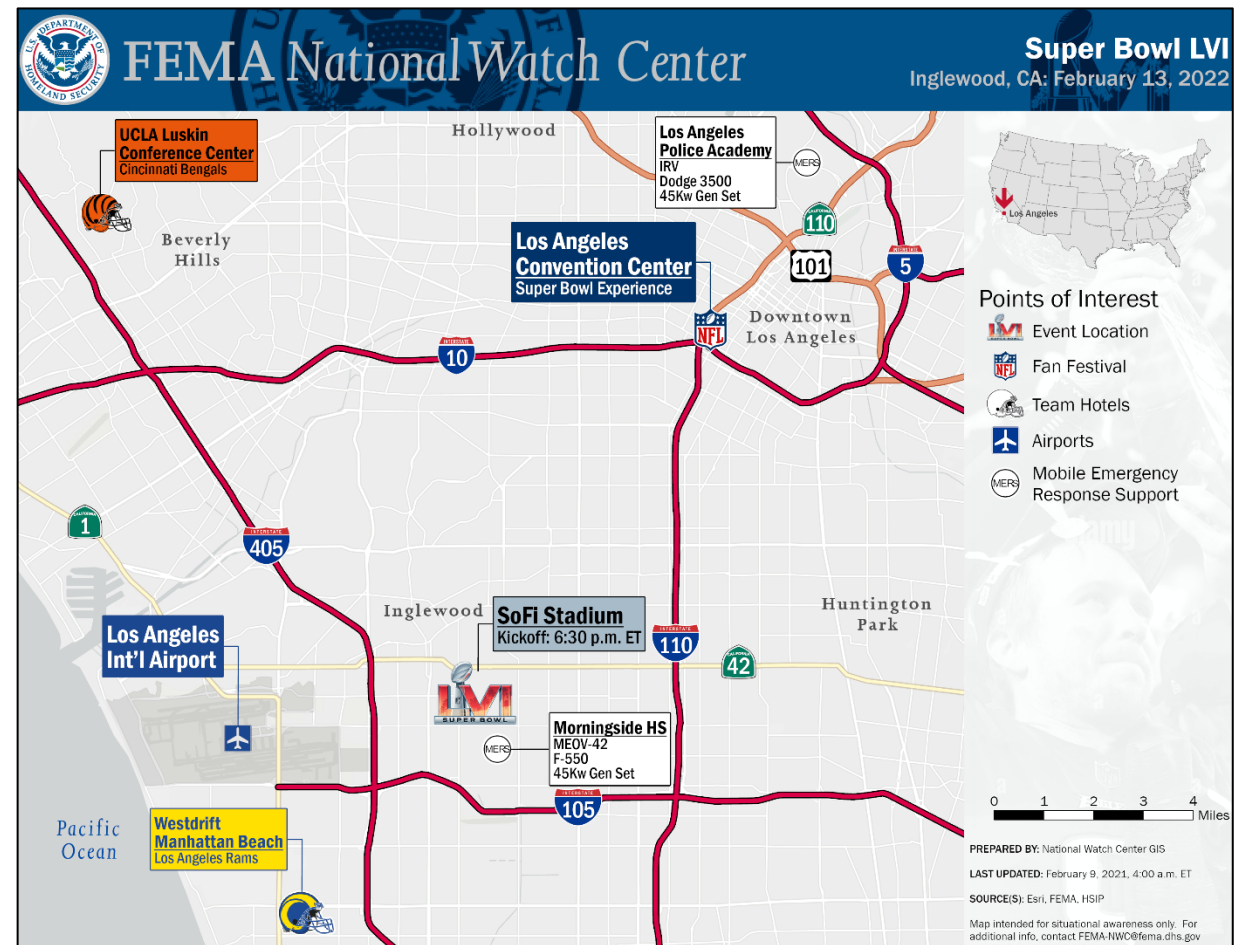
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# Super Bowl LVI – California

**Situation:** Super Bowl LVI (SBLVI) will take place at the SoFi Stadium in Inglewood, California on February 13, 2022. Extensive crowds are expected, however there is no information to indicate a specific, credible threat to or associated with Super Bowl LVI or related events in Inglewood, California. Local, state, and federal agencies are in coordination and are prepared to respond to any incident.

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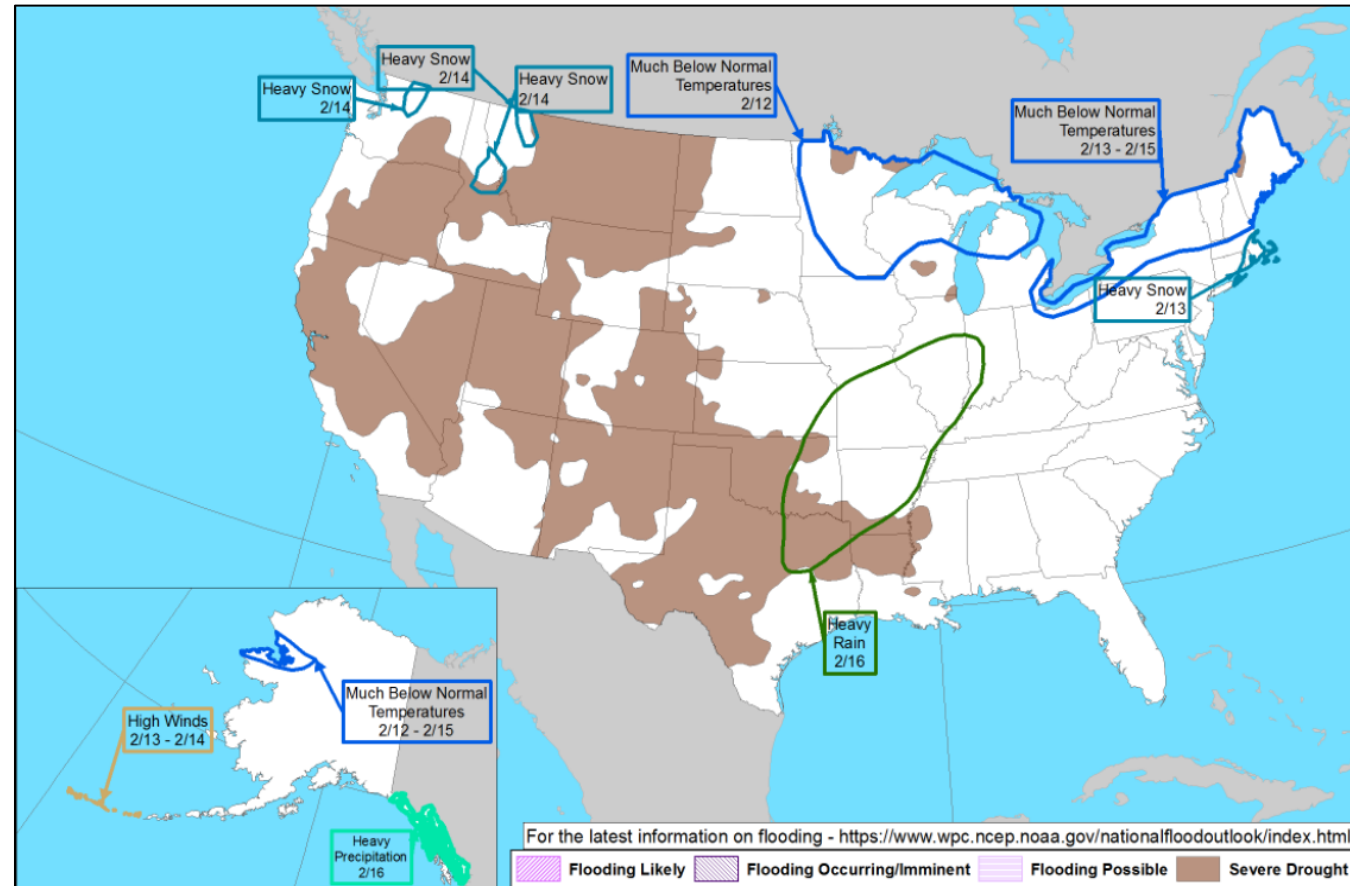

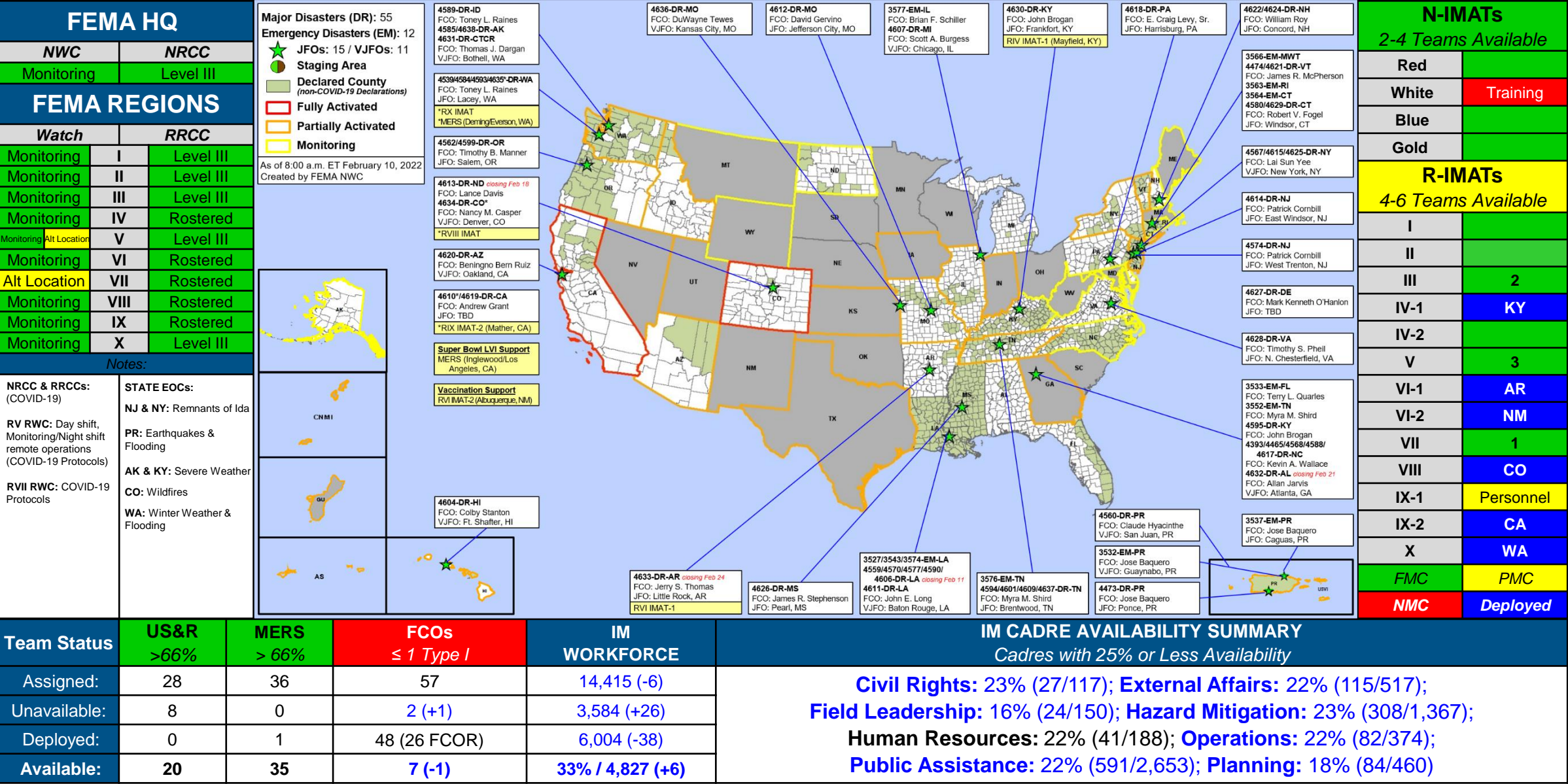

## INCIDENT SUMMARY

The remnants of Hurricane Ida impacted Connecticut September 1, through September 2, 2021. Connecticut experienced 21k power outages, 7-8 inches of rain and flooding, and the state's first ever flash flood warning. On September 22nd Governor Lamont requested and President Biden approved a major disaster declaration on October 30, 2021, designating Fairfield and New London counties, including the Mashantucket Pequot and the Mohegan Tribal Nations for Individual Assistance. New Haven was added December 1, 2021. Public Assistance was designated February 3, 2022.

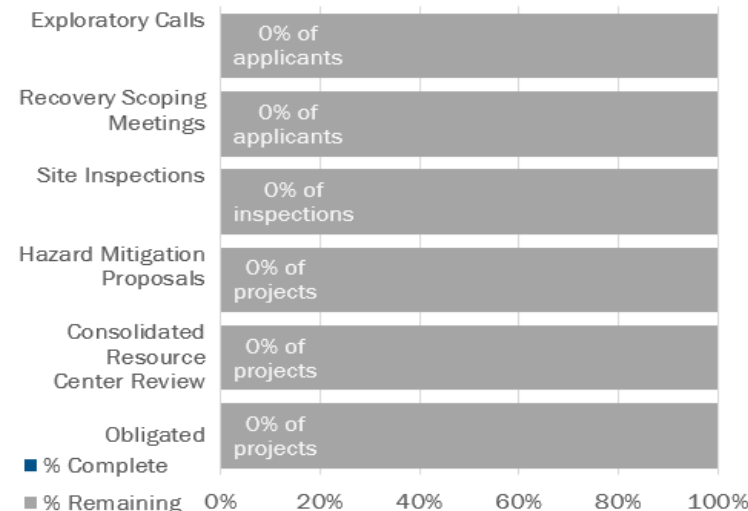

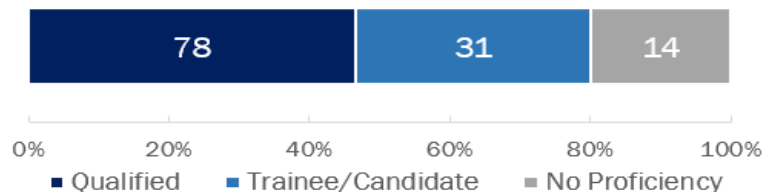

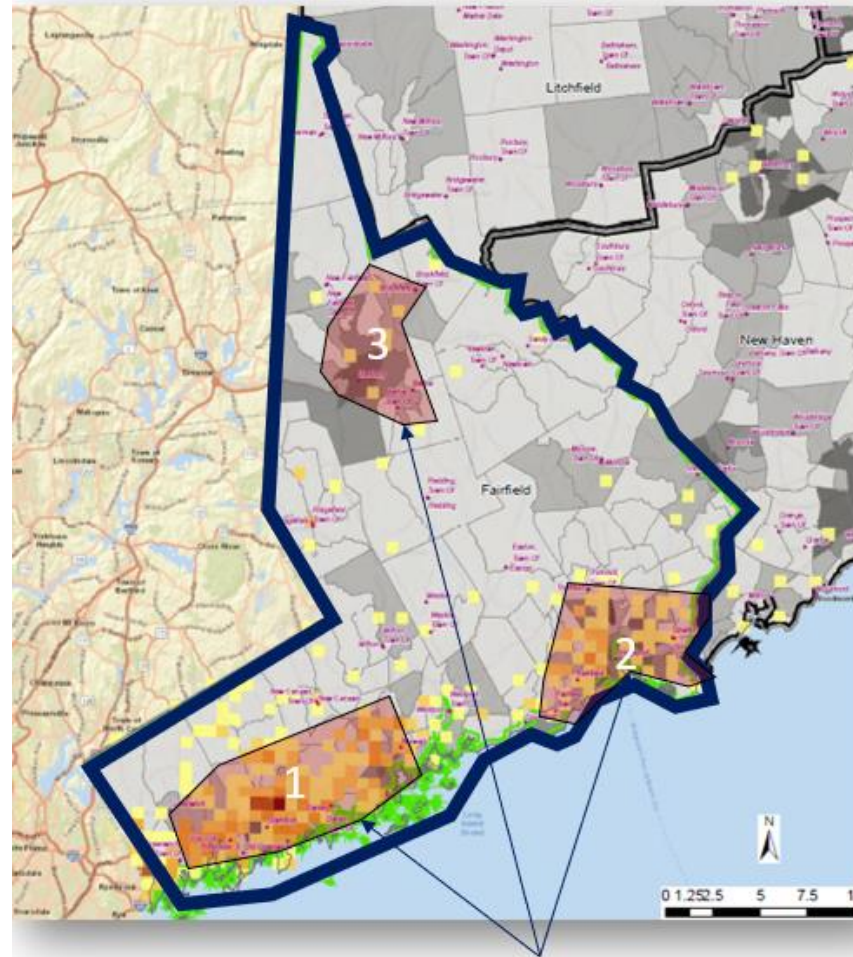

**Outcome Indicators (H 2):** Survivors can afford post-disaster permanent housing units within the affected community without post-disaster assistance

#### **McKinney Hotel Conversion to Supportive Sheltering and Transitional services**

- Goal = convert hotel into supportive sheltering for single individuals with wrap around-onsite, case-management
- Target Audience = Support for Homeless individuals
- Services = AA/NA meetings; Mental Health support; Physical Health support; Nutrition; Employment and Training opportunities; Broadband & Energy reduction; Legal Services

#### **Coordinating Ongoing Support & Collaboration from Other Federal Agencies:**

- DOE; DOJ; DOL; ED; FTA; HHS(ACF; SAMHSA); HUD; SBA; USACE; USDA

**Desired Outcome = Housing Solutions which do not require DRE funding**





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
