Impacts:


- Power Outages in Region V: 860k (4%) customers without power

- All other impacted state EOCs remain at Normal Operations






National Weather Forecast






Snowfall Forecast

INCIDENT SUMMARY

A Major Disaster Declaration was approved for the State of Florida on September 29, 2022, designating all 67 counties and the Miccosukee Tribe of Indians of Florida and Seminole Tribe of Florida for Public Assistance (Cat. B), nine (9) counties for Individual Assistance and the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program statewide. Thirteen subsequent amendments designated Public Assistance (Cat. A and C-G) for 28 counties, and Individual Assistance for 17 additional counties.


