



California – RFC River Forecasts / Snow Water Equivalent




National Weather Forecast






Severe Weather Outlook





INCIDENT SUMMARY


The Commonwealth of Virginia Declared a State of Emergency on July 13, 2022. On September 11, 2022, the Commonwealth requested that the federal government declare a major disaster. On September 30, 2022, President Joseph Biden declared a major flooding and mudslides disaster for the Commonwealth of Virginia. Two Virginia counties received Public Assistance (75% cost share). Designated counties are Buchanan and Tazewell. All Counties in Virginia are eligible for Hazard Mitigation assistance.


