



Severe Weather Outlook



Situation:

- The fire began on May 17 and is burning on state and private land in and around the town of Buffalo Gap (population 543) and the community of Hidden Valley in Taylor County, 8 miles SW of Abilene, TX
- Threatening 752 primary homes, businesses, a school, a fire station, a water shed, electrical infrastructure, a wind farm, rail service, and U.S. Highway 277
- Mandatory evacuation in effect for 1,000 people
- Shelter established with 4 occupants

Response:

- TX EOC at Partial Activation (COVID-19)
- · Region VI, Denton MOC, and the NWC continue to monitor
- Region VI RRCC at Level III (wildfires); IMAT-2 deployed to NM (wildfires)
- FMAG approved May 18, 2022






INCIDENT SUMMARY

Two separate severe storms impacted NH on 29-30JUL21 and 1-2AUG resulting in significant damage to state and local roads. The Governor's request was for 29JUL-2AUG; the initial DR was for only 29-30JUL21. An appeal for the full incident period was approved on Jan 3, 2022 for 2 counties, PA only for Cheshire and Sullivan Counties and HM statewide. This is a State-Led for Customer Service Disaster.
