Severe Weather – Central Plains/Midwest

<u>Situation:</u> Severe weather moved through portions of the Central Plains and the Midwest Tuesday evening with the NOAA SPC receiving over 330 total storm reports for high winds, tornadoes, and large hail, resulting in 4 confirmed reports of fatalities, injuries, and property damage. Damage assessments are ongoing.





Tropical Outlook – Atlantic – 7 Day


Disturbance 1 (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Formation chance 48 hour: Low (10%); 7-day: Low (10%)








Severe Weather Outlook





Hazards Outlook – May 25-29





