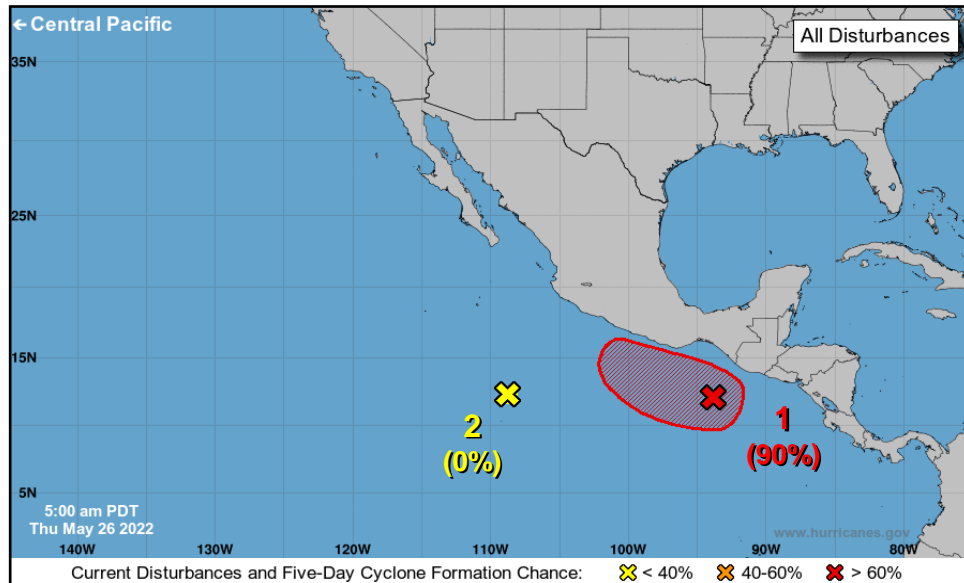

Disturbance 1 (as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Large area of disorganized showers located hundred miles south-southwest of the Gulf of Tehuantepec
- Tropical depression is likely to form this weekend
- Moving slowly westward at 5 to 10 mph
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Medium (60%); 5-day: High (90%)

Disturbance 2 (as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Located several hundred miles of the coast of southwest Mexico
- Significant development is no longer expected
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 5-day: Low (near 0%)

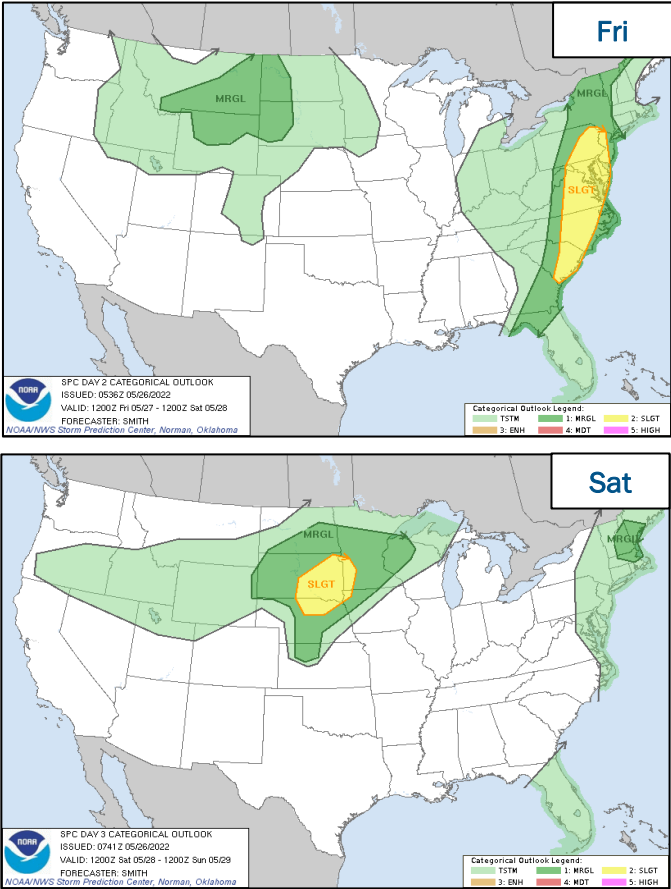
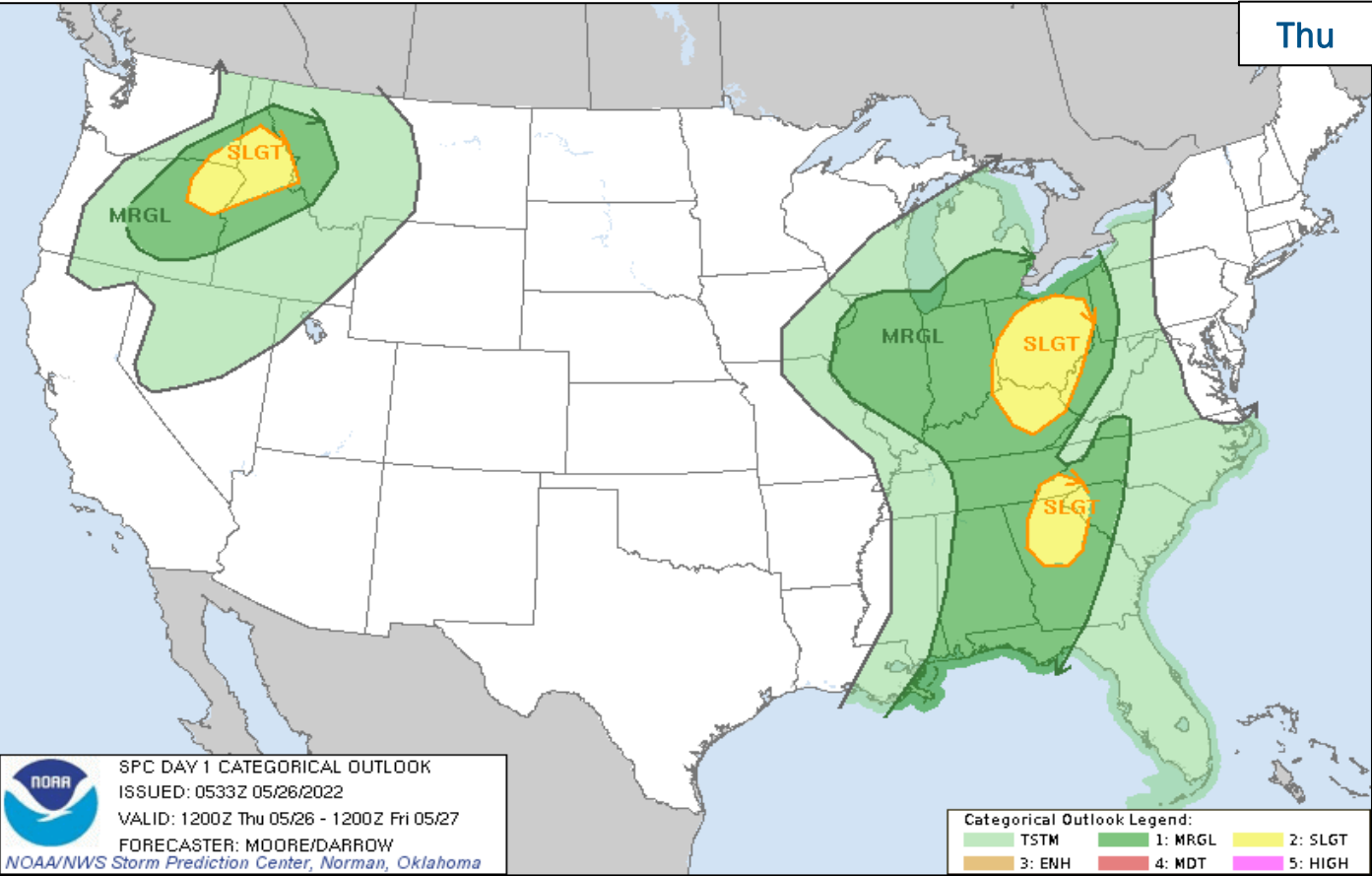
National Weather Forecast

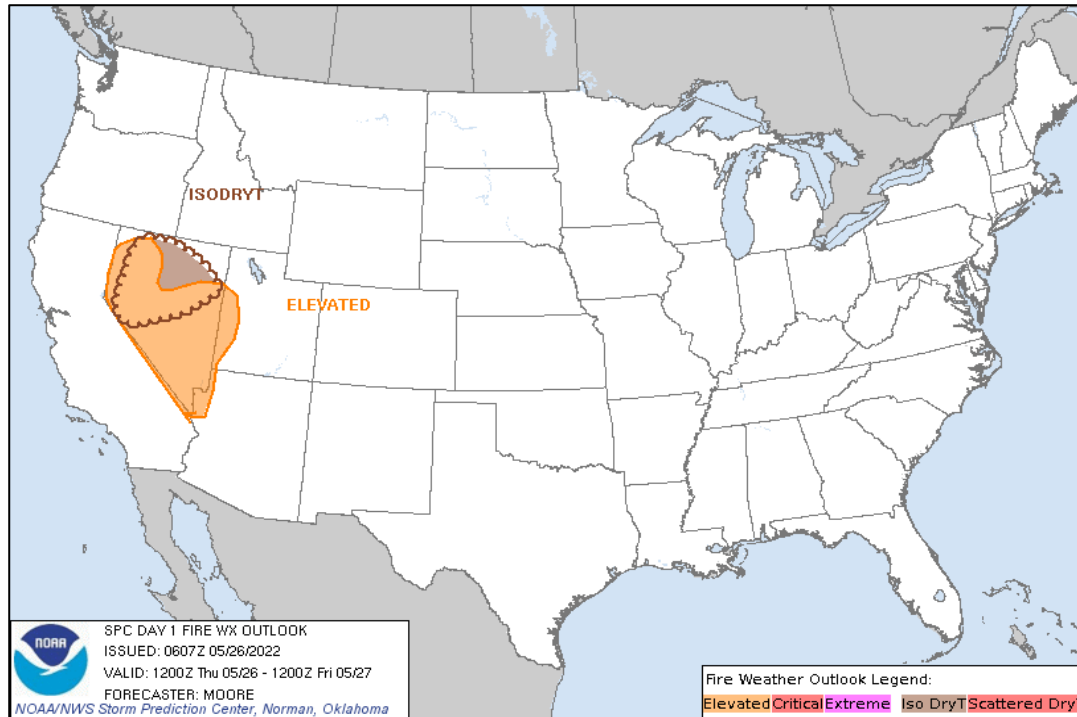

Severe Weather Outlook

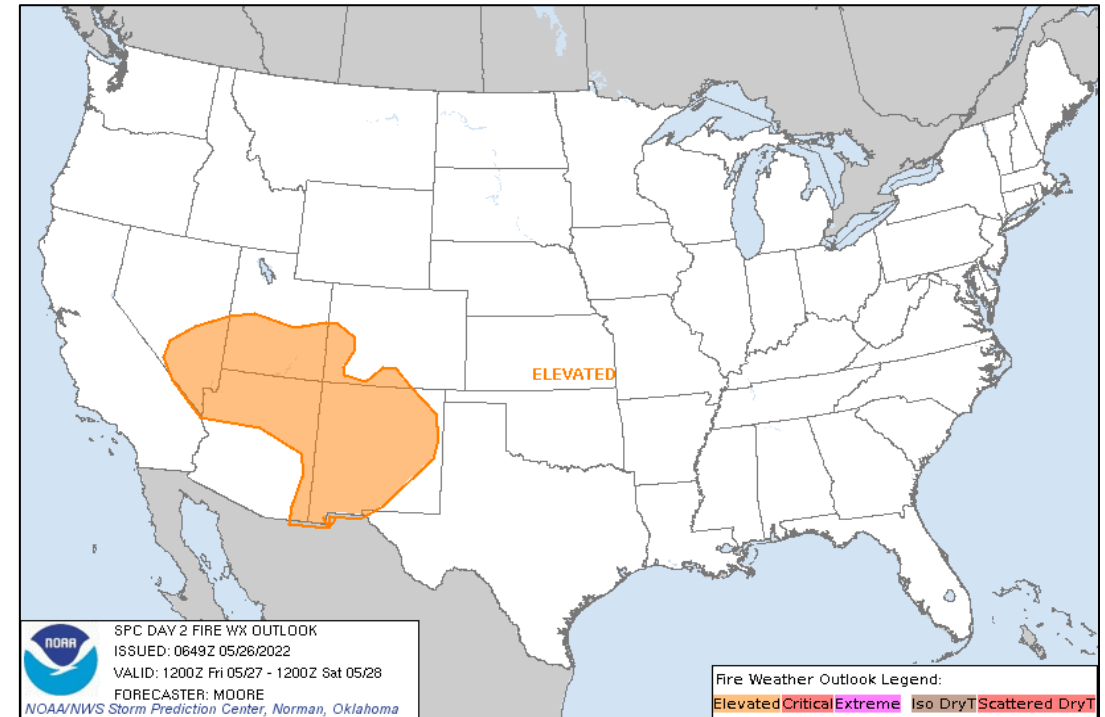

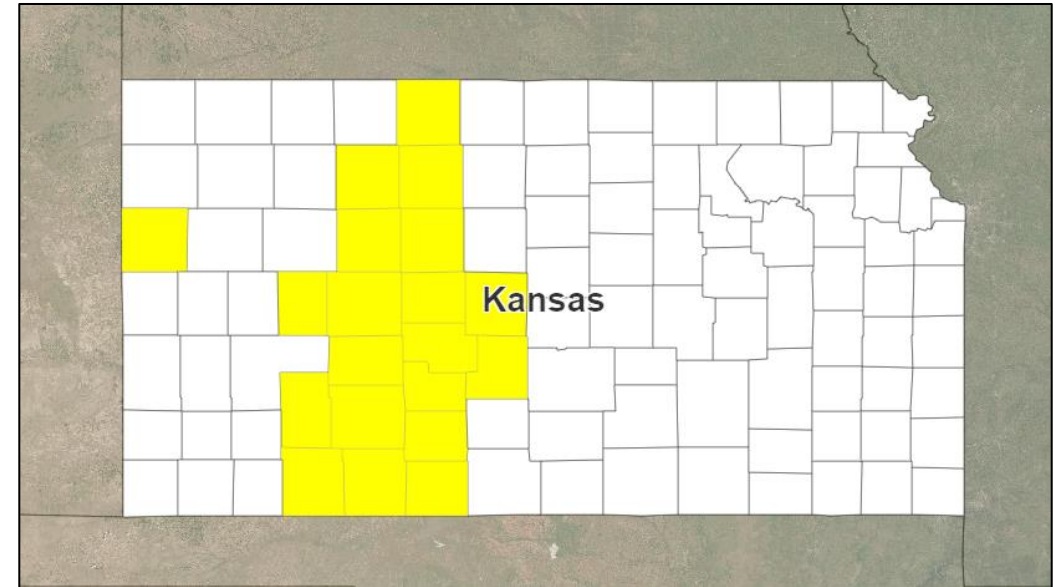

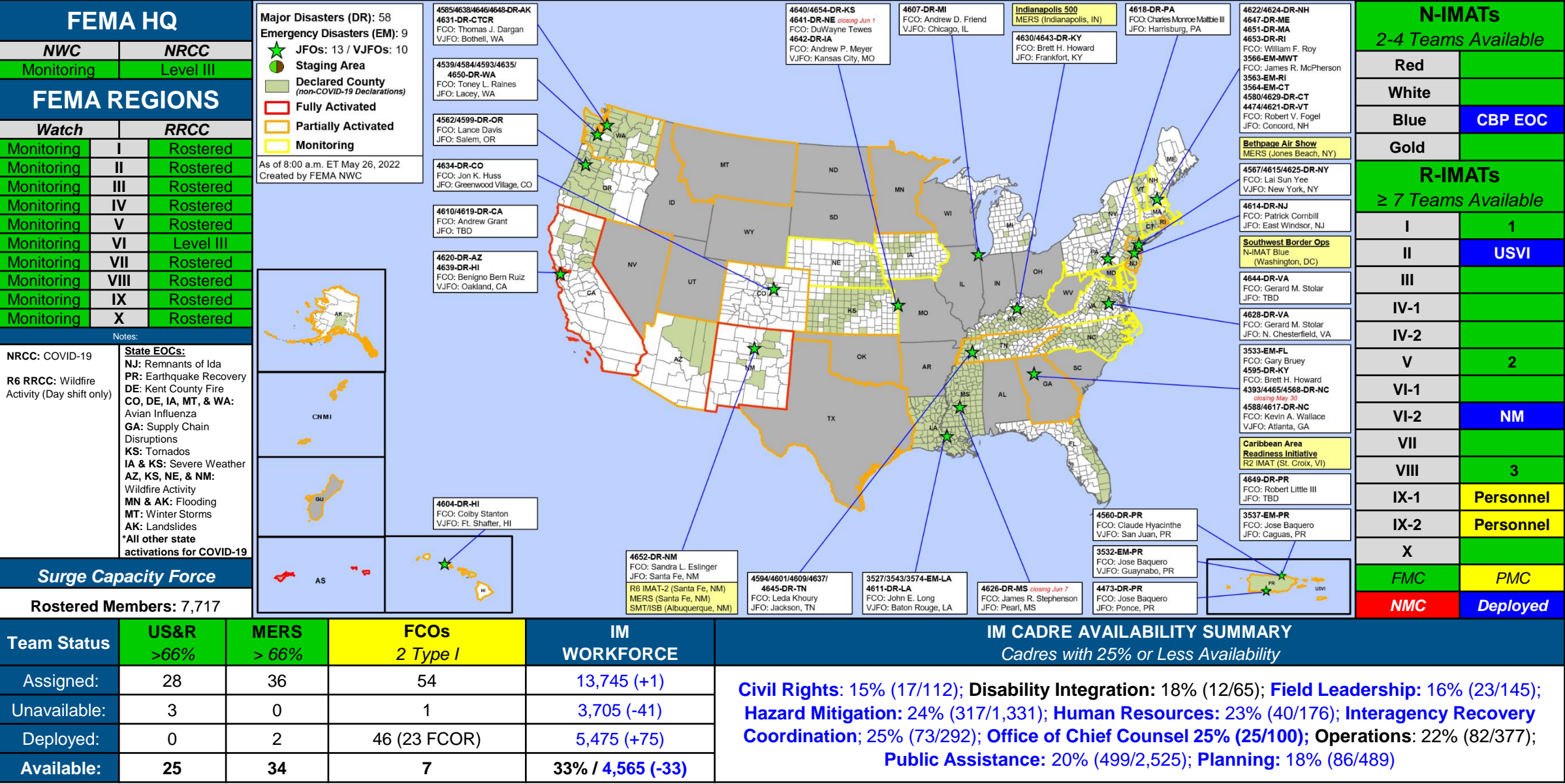

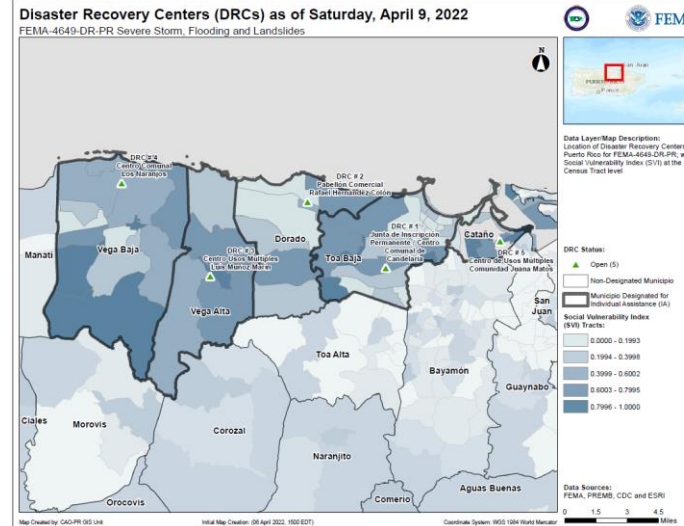

INCIDENT SUMMARY

Severe storms from February 4-6, 2022, resulted in a Major Disaster Declaration for the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, declared March 29, 2022. The declaration authorized Individual Assistance (IA) in the Municipalities of Cataño, Dorado, Toa Baja, Vega Baja, and Vega Alta with all areas of the Commonwealth eligible to apply for assistance under the Hazard Mitigation Grant

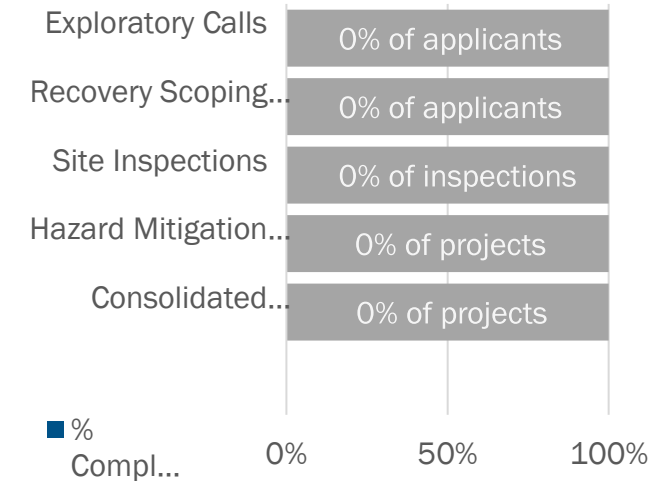

- National flood insurance policy notification to policy holders by Puerto Rico government
- Use of local reservists to build capacity and reduce costs: better quality of life for responders while deployed
- Effective outreach to all five Municipal Mayors supported by PREMB, COR3 and CAO enabled a cooperative relationship that benefitted survivors
- Future Information Sharing and Access Agreements (ISAA) process being established by OCC for quicker implementation ahead of hurricane season
