

#### Disturbance 1 (as of 8:00 a.m. ET)


- Large area of disorganized showers located hundred miles south-southwest of the Gulf of Tehuantepec

- Formation chance 48-hour: Medium (60%); 5-day: High (90%)

#### Disturbance 2 (as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Located several hundred miles of the coast of southwest Mexico
- Significant development is no longer expected
- Formation chance 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 5-day: Low (near 0%)







### **Severe Weather Outlook**





### **Fire Weather Outlook**



- National flood insurance policy notification to policy holders by Puerto Rico government
