Super Typhoon Mawar - Guam/CNMI



Situation: (SLB as of 7:30 a.m. ET)

Mission priorities remain focused on restoration of utilities to critical infrastructure including power within the impacted area. Federal teams, commodities, and equipment continue to move into the impacted areas to respond and stabilize community lifelines.

Lifelines:

- Food, Water, Shelter:
- GU: 4 shelters open with 861 occupants
- GU: 53% water systems (87,705 pop) operational
- GU: GWA coordinated deployment of water bladders; delivered 8 water bladders around the island
- GU: Andersen AFB water distribution center has one generator nonoperational; 2-3 days of water left; 3-5 days bypass system restoration
- CNMI: 22,800 liters water, 15,200 meals requested; ETA from DC Guam is May 29
- Health and Medical:
- GU: 2 community health centers operating 24-hours to support nonurgent care
- CNMI: Rota Health Center power and water restored
- Fnergy
- GU: Power restored to approximately 5,240 (12%) of customers
- o CNMI: Power restored to 350 (36% total) of customers in Rota
- Communication:
- Carrier damage assessments ongoing; backup generators deployed to cell sites; no reported outages to Public Safety Answer Point (PSAP), switching centers, or AM stations
- GU: 36% of cell sites operational
- Transportation:
- GU: Guam International Airport open for humanitarian and emergency relief flights only
- o CNMI: All airports operational, open to pre-disaster operations hours
- Guam, Rota, Tinian and Saipan ports open

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Territory/Local Response:

- GU EOC at Full Activation; Governor declared a State of Emergency
- CNMI EOC at Partial Activation



- National IMAT Red arrived in Guam, Region VIII IMAT on alert to support Region IX
- Logistics: SMT Tracy/ISB Alpha deployed to GU
- Distribution Centers in GU, HI, and CA adequately stocked and ready to deploy commodities
- Transportation Augmentation Contract activated for Guam and CNMI for multi-modal transportation
- National Evacuation Air Transportation Support Service and Aviation Ground Support contracts activated
- MERS: 19 (+13) personnel and communications equipment deployed to GU
- US&R IST Blue on a 2-hour notice

Time Conversion Chart






National Weather Forecast


