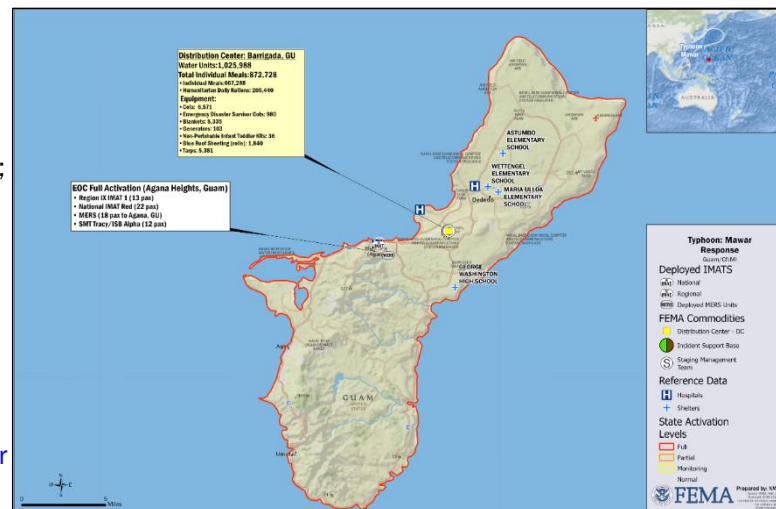


Situation: (SLB as of 6:00 a.m. ET)

Mission priorities remain focused on restoration of utilities to critical infrastructure including power within the impacted area. Federal teams, commodities, and equipment continue to move into the impacted areas to respond and stabilize community lifelines.

Lifelines:

- Food, Water, Shelter:
 - 4 shelters open with 758 (+1) occupants
 - GWA 50% water systems operational; 20% of other water systems operational; boil water notice in effect; 4 of 9 wastewater facilities operational
 - Requested 25k meals and 34k liters of water for 4 shelter sites; FEMA delivered food & water to all shelters
 - Andersen AFB Water Distribution working on repairs; chlorine pumps operational but a boil water notice still in effect
- Health and Medical: Guam EOC provided fuel resupply to 1 CHC and 1 Lab; GWA coordinating water tank supply
- Energy:
 - Nighttime operations continue to prepare generators for next day installations; 68% feeders operable, power outages anticipated to slightly fluctuate with incoming inclement weather
- Communication:
 - Carrier damage assessments ongoing; generators deployed to cell sites without commercial power
 - 150 (48%) of cell sites operational



Territory/Local Response:

- GU EOC at Full Activation; Governor declared a State of Emergency

FEMA/Federal Response:

- Region IX: IMAT-1 deployed to GU and CNMI
 - ESFs 1,3,4,7,8,10-14, USCG, DCE, USACE SMEs and power Planning and Response Team in Guam; DOD LNOs in GU and CNMI; DOD DCO supporting from CA; USCG SAR in HI; USACE roofing PRT SMEs in HI; 104 Disaster Survivor Assistance (DSA) staff enroute to Guam
 - Disaster Recovery Center Taskforce standing up May 31
- FEMA HQ
 - NRCC activated 24/7
 - Major Disaster Declaration FEMA-4715-DR-GU approved May 25; Emergency Declarations FEMA-3593-EM-MP and FEMA-3594-EM-GU approved May 22; Amendment No. 1 to FEMA-4715-DR-GU adds Individual Assistance
 - National IMAT Red in GU, Region VIII IMAT on alert
 - Logistics: SMT Tracy/ISB Alpha deployed to GU
 - Distribution Centers in GU, HI, and CA adequately stocked and ready to deploy commodities
 - MERS: 19 personnel and communications equipment deployed to GU

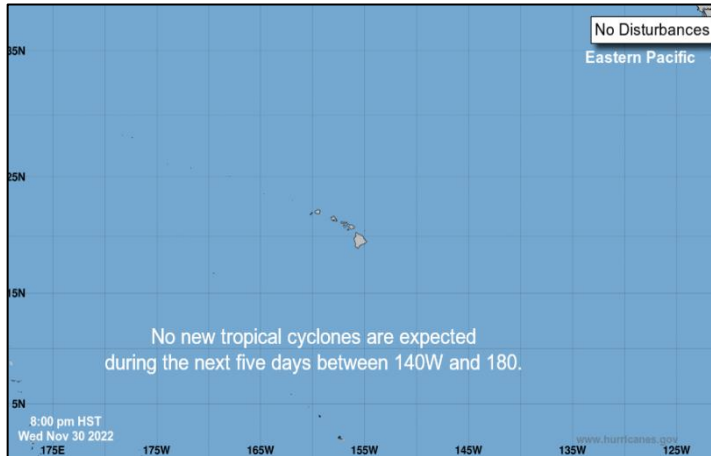


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Tropical Outlook – Seven-Day

Central Pacific



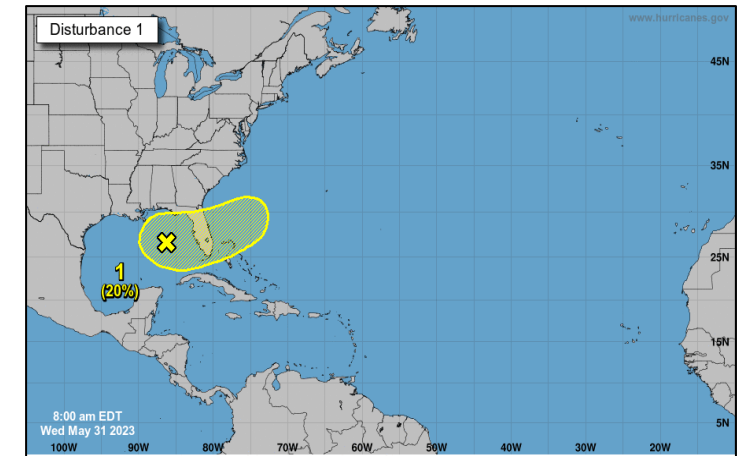

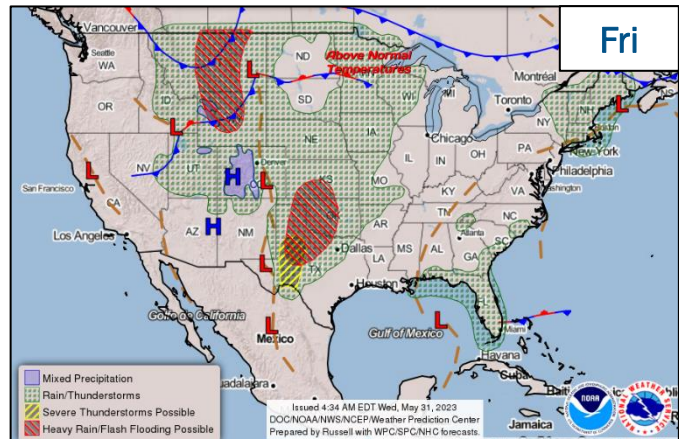
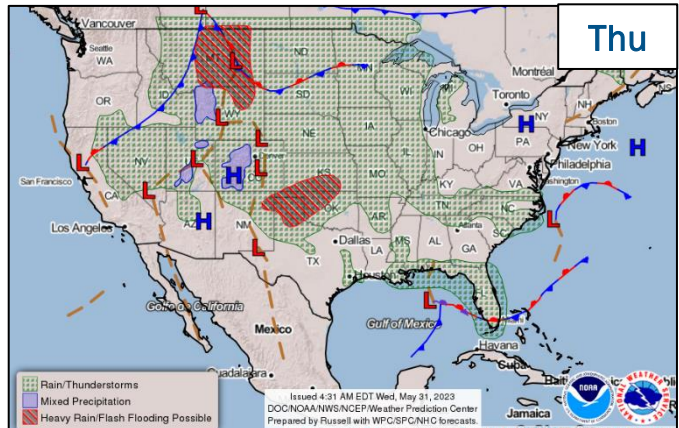
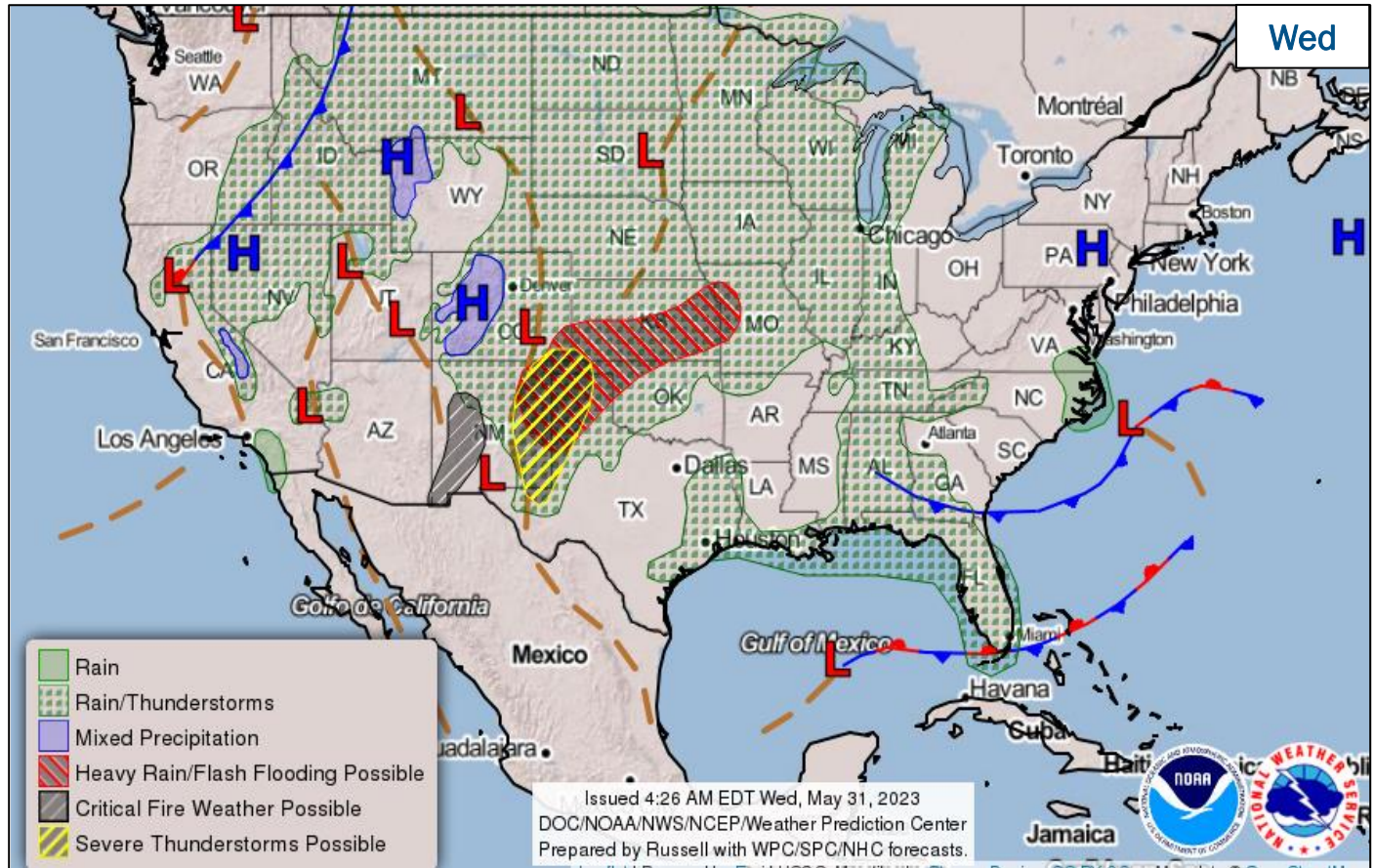


- **Disturbance 1:** (as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Formation chance – 48 hour: Low (10%); 7-day: Low (20%)



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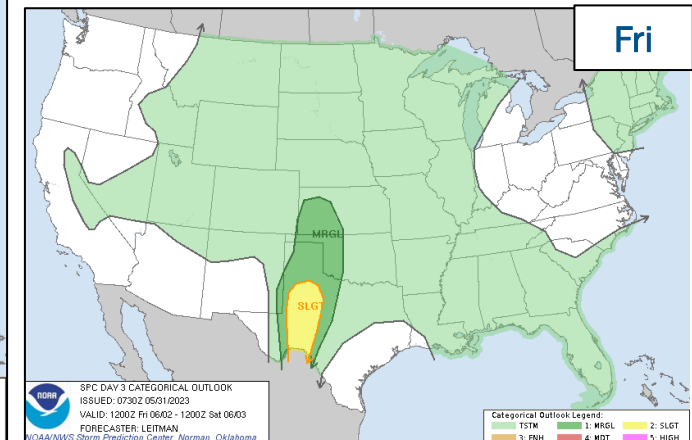
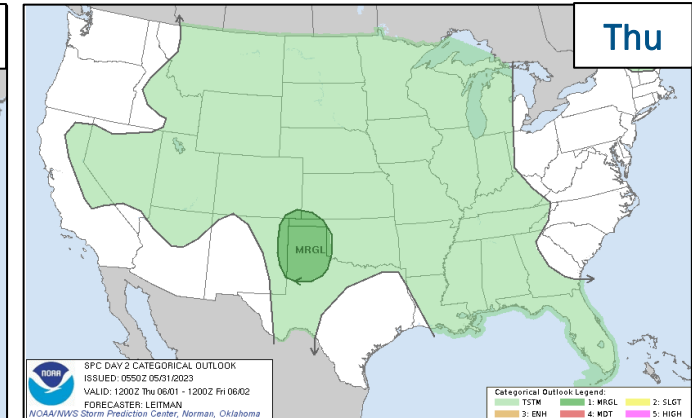
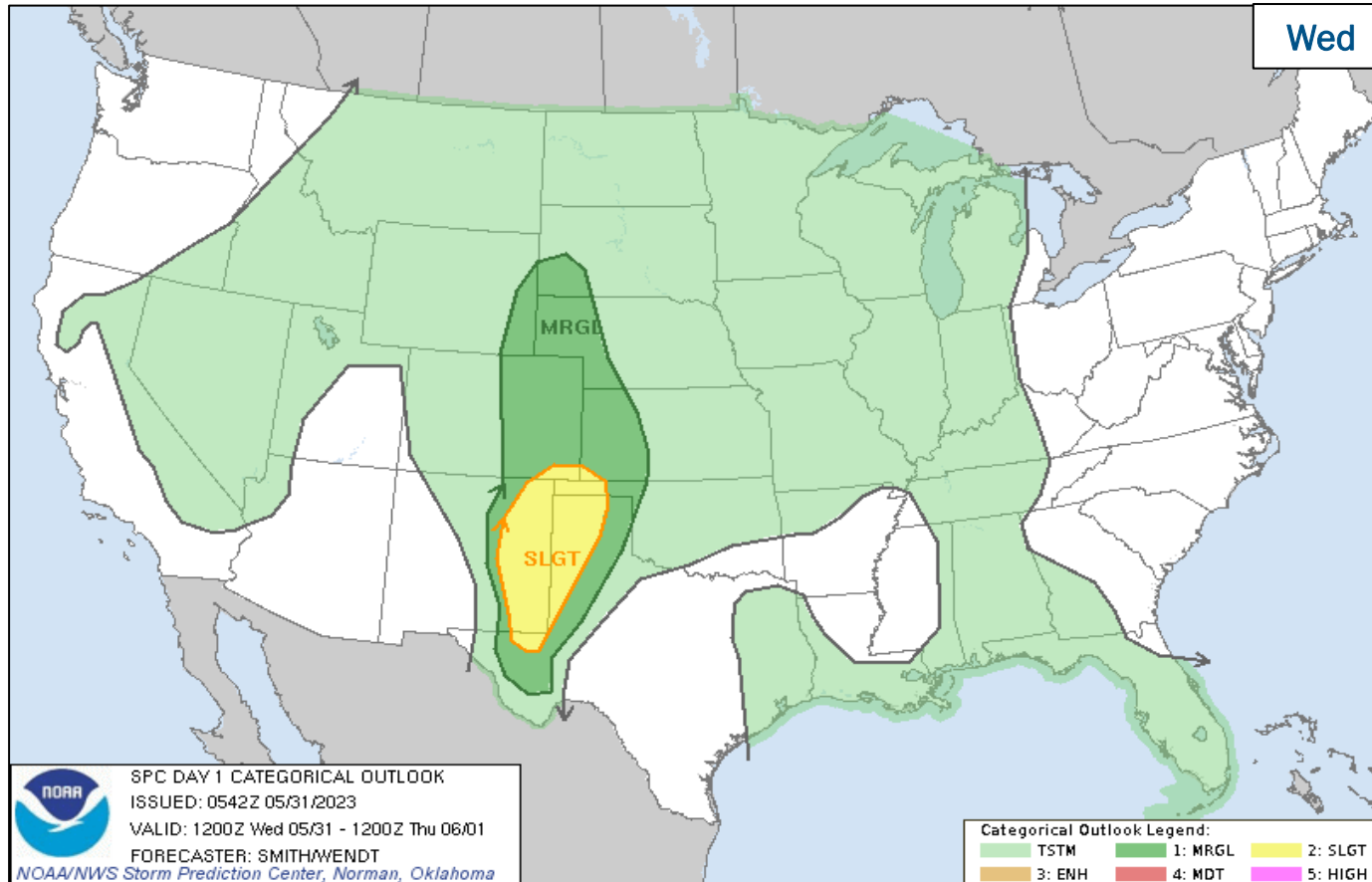
National Weather Forecast



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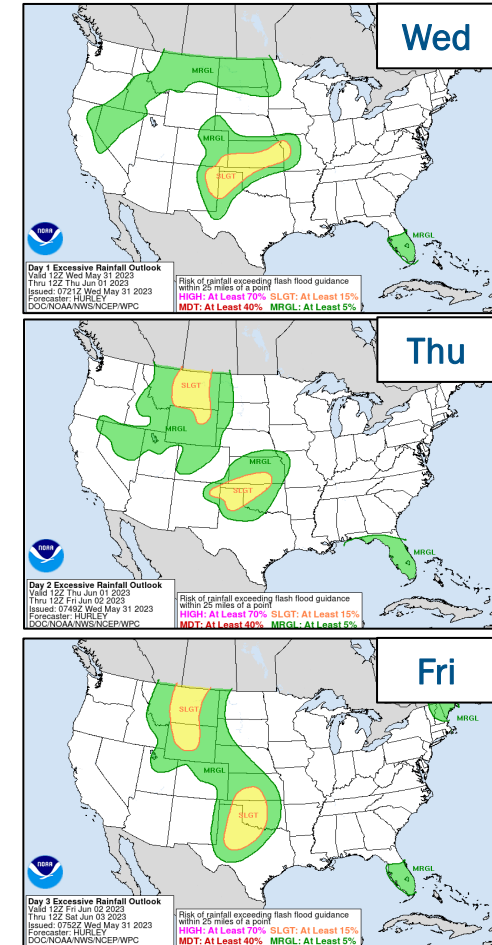
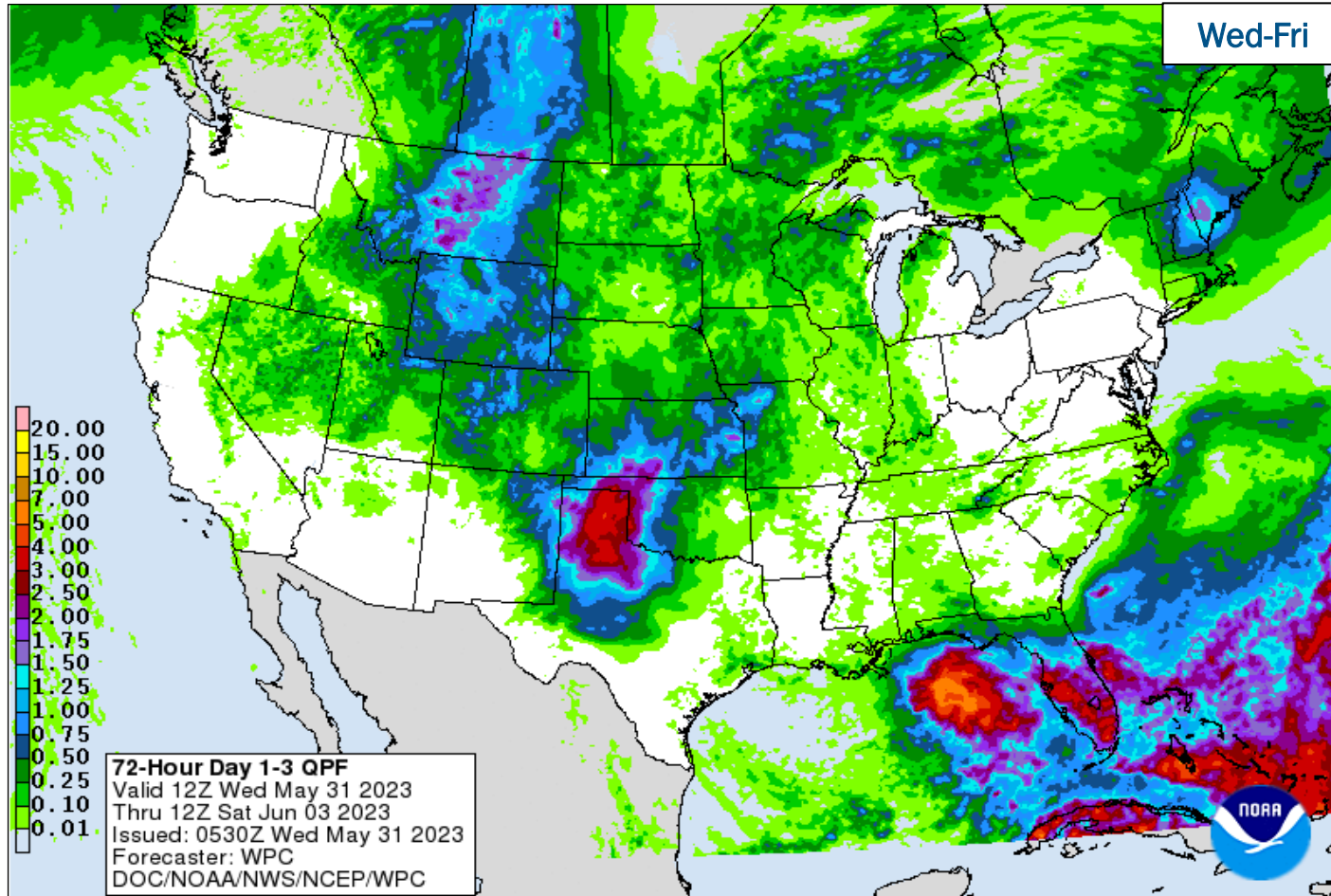
Severe Weather Outlook

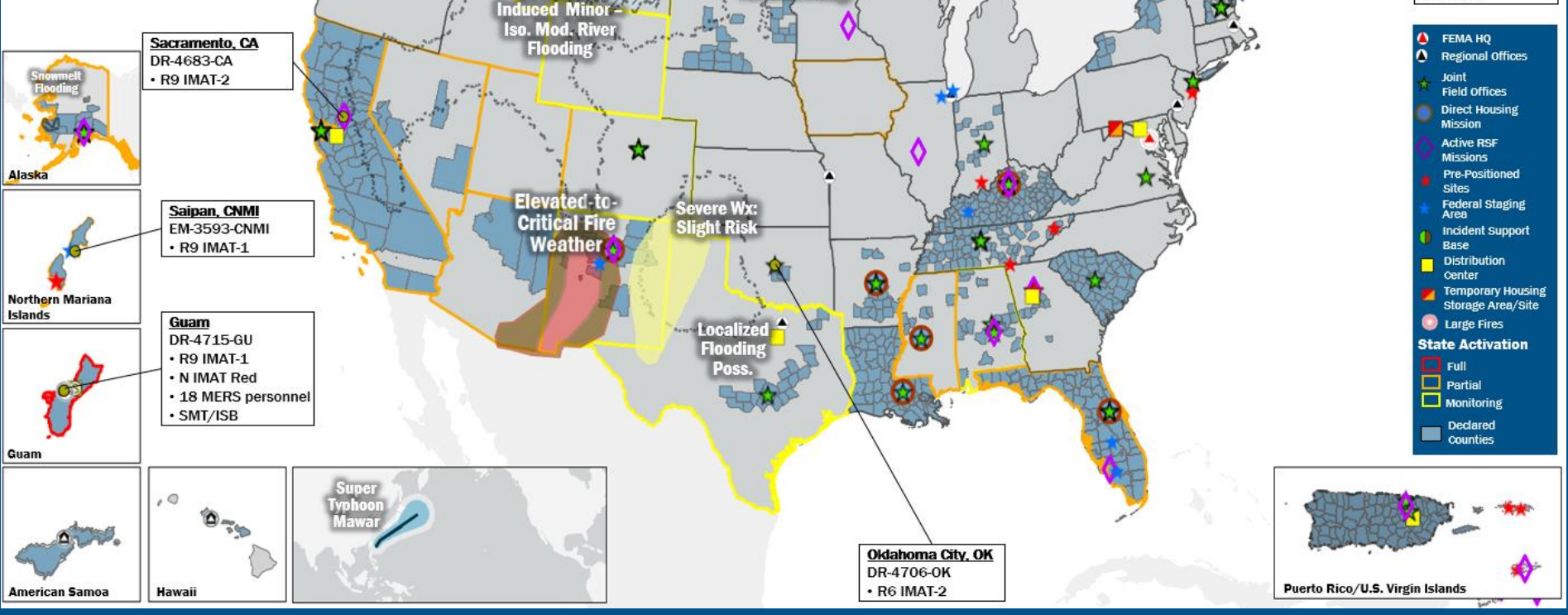

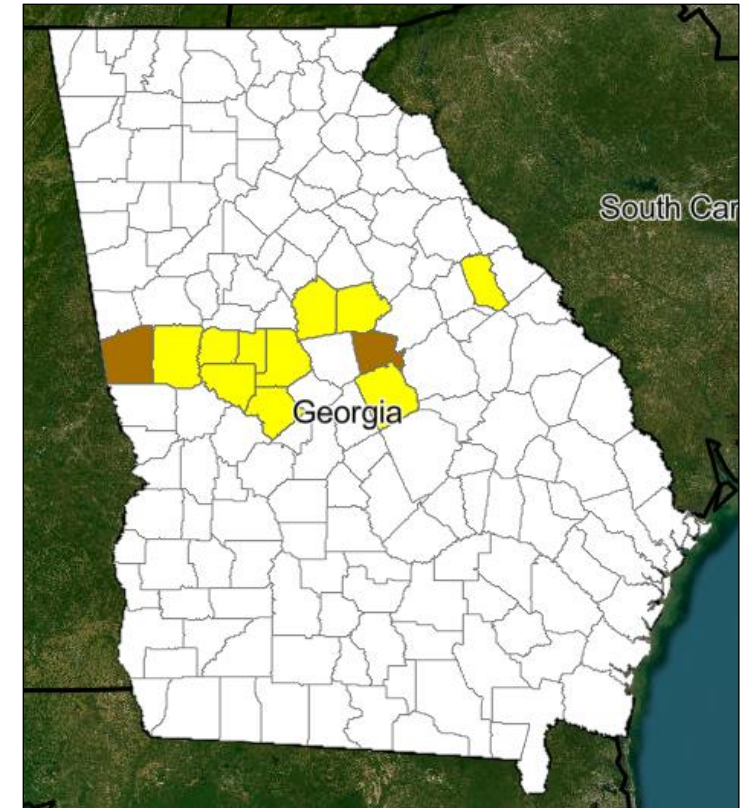
