

Tropical Outlook - Five Day




- Located near the east coast of the Yucatan Peninsula

- Formation chance 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 5-day: Low (near 0%)




National Weather Forecast











INCIDENT SUMMARY

On August 29, 2021, a Major Disaster Declaration was approved for the State of Louisiana designating IA and PA (Cat. A) for 25 parishes, PA (Cat. B), including direct federal assistance and Hazard Mitigation, statewide, and provided 100% federal funding for PA (Cat. A & B) for 30 days from the start of the incident period. Five amendments to the declaration have added 23 parishes for PA (Cat. C-G), approved 10 parishes for Direct Housing, and authorized 100% federal funding for PA (Cat. A & B) for 45 days from the start of the incident period.



Recovery Outcomes

INFRASTRUCTURE: Restored, modernized, hardened and resilient systems

Outcome Indicator (5): Government and PNP facilities have been repaired, modernized and strengthened for future disasters

- Impacts to the damaged HOW's limited the ability to provide services to their communities, which in many cases, were the underserved or those with a higher need of assistance. Many HOW's provide life essential needs during non-disaster situations
- Working with our SBA partners to refine both agencies' processes allowed HOW applications to move forward with fewer issues and were less burdensome to the applicant. This has created stronger partnerships and allows FEMA to better serve survivors in future events
- Outreach was key to ensure FEMA programs were made available and to lessen the complexities of the PA program process. Outreach was designed to better explain PA program. Currently developing same outreach for HM program
- Outcome of efforts was 29% or 169 of total PA applicants are Houses of Worship.
