

Potential Tropical Cyclone One – Atlantic

Situation: (Advisory #7A, as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- 45 miles SSW of Ft. Myers, FL
- Maximum sustained winds 40 mph
- Moving NE at 18 mph
- Expected to move across southern or central Florida today and over the southwestern Atlantic north of the Bahamas tonight
- Expected to develop into a tropical storm tonight; 48-hour formation chance: High (90%), 5-day formation chance: High (90%)
- Tropical-storm-force-winds extend outward up to 275 miles
- Rainfall: 6-10 inches in central and south FL and FL Keys, with maximums of 15 inches possible across south FL and FL Keys; may produce considerable flash and urban flooding
- Storm surge: 1-2 feet in some coastal areas of FL
- Tornadoes: Isolated tornadoes possible over south FL and the Keys through this afternoon
- Tropical Storm Warnings: FL Keys & Dry Tortugas, FL Bay, west coast of FL from Bonita Beach to Card Sound Bridge, east coast of FL south of the Volusia/Brevard County Line to Card Sound Bridge, and Lake Okeechobee



State / Local Preparations and Response:

- FL EOC at Normal Operations, no requests for FEMA assistance Power outages under 1%
- Minor traffic disruptions from localized flooding



- NRCC at Level III (COVID-19); NWC continues to monitor




Tropical Outlook - Five Day


Central Pacific Eastern Pacific Atlantic




Potential Tropical Cyclone One (as of 8:00 a.m. ET)




Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall






National Weather Forecast







