Super Typhoon Mawar – Guam




Situation: Locally executed, state managed, and federally supported recovery operations continue within the areas impacted by Super Typhoon Mawar. Mission priorities continue to focus on community lifeline stabilization and expanding recovery operations.

Lifelines: (SLB #15 as of 4:41 a.m. ET, June 8)

- Food, Water, Shelter:
- o 3 shelters open with 698 (-50) occupants; 1 shelter open at Andersen AFB with 57 occupants
- Roofing materials arriving 6/8 6/13
- o 73% of wells operational; 3 of 8 drinking water systems operational, 5 partially operational
- 9 Water stations positioned in key locations to provide potable water
- 100% of wastewater systems operational; 4 on island power, 5 on back-up generators
- Health and Medical:
- Medical facilities operational; continuing to restore full operational capabilities
- Energy:
- Power restored to 68 % (+5%) of system load (customer demand); 49% (+6%) of customers restored: 100% of substations restored
- 65 (+8%)% of cell sites operational




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


National Weather Forecast






Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall



COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE: Resilient recovery of SLTT communities

Outcome Indicator (C3): Strategies in place to engage and support long-term recovery of impacted communities

- · Disaster Recovery Registration Events
 - Focus of mission was in areas with high SVI to include veterans, Gullah Geechee community, and low broadband access
 - AME Church in Georgetown County was a convenient location for survivors
 - Coordination with Civil Rights Advisor resulted in registration intake events for socially vulnerable populations
- · Voluntary Agency Liaison
 - Trident VOAD (10 community groups) had become inactive since COVID and were revitalized due to efforts of the State and Voluntary Agency Liaisons
 - Increased resiliency and recovery capabilities from future events
- · Integrated Recovery Coordination Efforts
 - Created five dynamic resource dashboards established as part of the Disaster resource library online repository
 - Philanthropic Advisor identified community assistance philanthropic resources for recovery and resilience projects
