




Hurricane Adrian (Advisory #7 as of 5:00 a.m. ET)

- 440 miles WSW of Manzanillo, Mexico
- Moving WNW at 8 mph
- Maximum sustained winds 85 mph
- Some additional strengthening possible next day or so
- Hurricane force winds extend 15 miles; tropical storm force winds extend 90 miles

<u>Tropical Depression Two-E</u> (Advisory #2A as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- 155 miles SW of Puerto Angel, Mexico
- Moving NW at 14 mph
- Maximum sustained winds 35 mph
- Expected to become a tropical storm later today




Disturbance 1 (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Formation chance 48-hour: Low (10%); 7-day: Low (20%)




National Weather Forecast






Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall







Severe Weather Outlook





Fire Weather Outlook



COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE: Resilient recovery of SLTT communities

- Initial Recovery Needs Assessment and convening with Federal Partners within three (3) weeks of disaster declaration.
- Tribal Leadership and Emergency Manager (EM) has identified building partnerships across state and federal agencies while increasing tribal capacity to enhance coordination and preparedness to support future response efforts throughout the communities and districts.
- Initiated a unique and holistic planning approach to support the tribe and align to tribal needs and operations more effectively through a cross-divisional team consisting of preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation.
