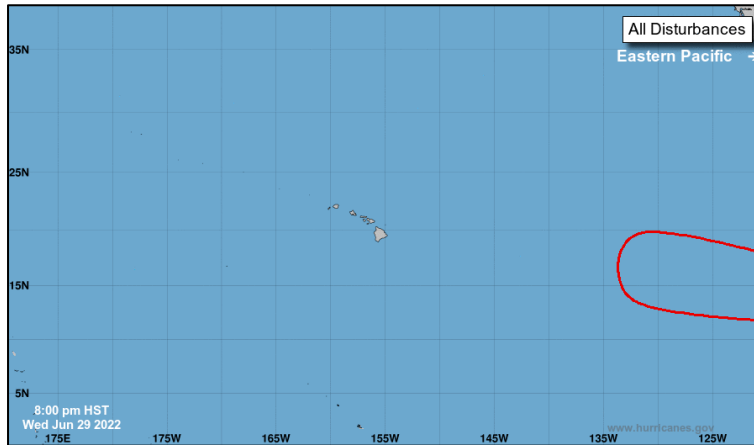

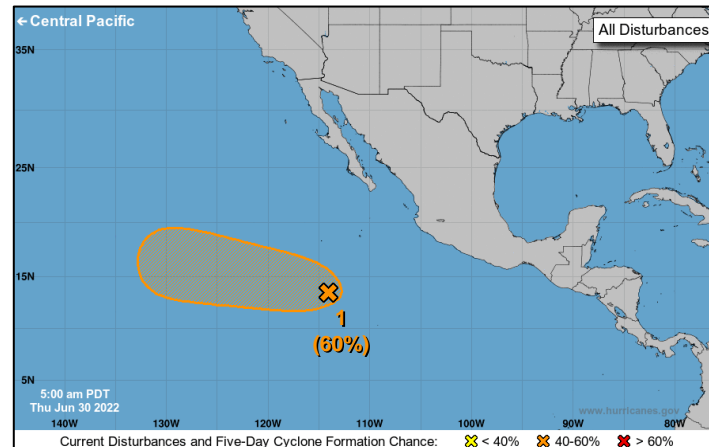
Tropical Outlook – Five Day

- No tropical cyclones are expected during the next 5 days

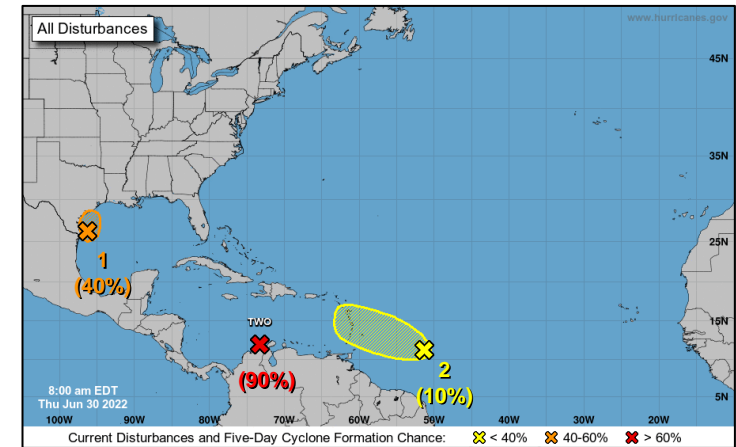
Eastern Pacific



Disturbance 1 (as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Located **several** hundred miles SSW of Baja California
- TD could form **during the next day or two** before reaching cooler waters on Saturday
- Formation chance – 48-hour: **Med (60%)**; 5-day: **Med (60%)**

Atlantic



Potential Tropical Cyclone Two (Advisory #11A as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- 710** miles E of Bluefields, Nicaragua; moving W at **20** mph
- Maximum sustained winds **40** mph
- Formation chance – 48-hour: High (**90%**); 5-day: High (**90%**)

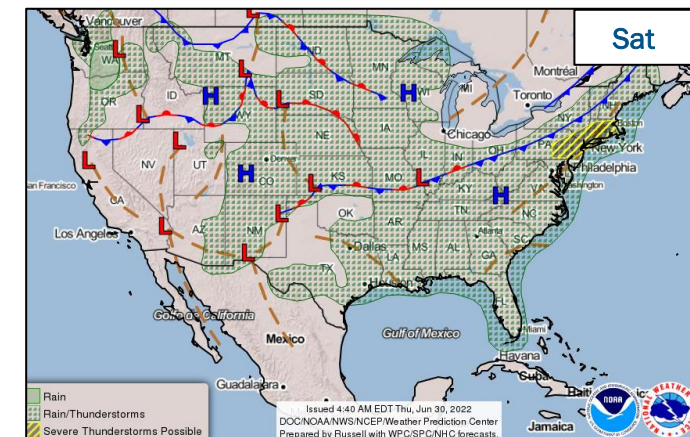
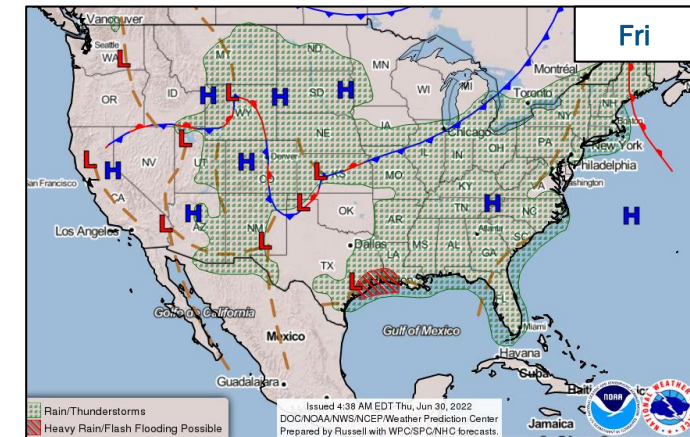
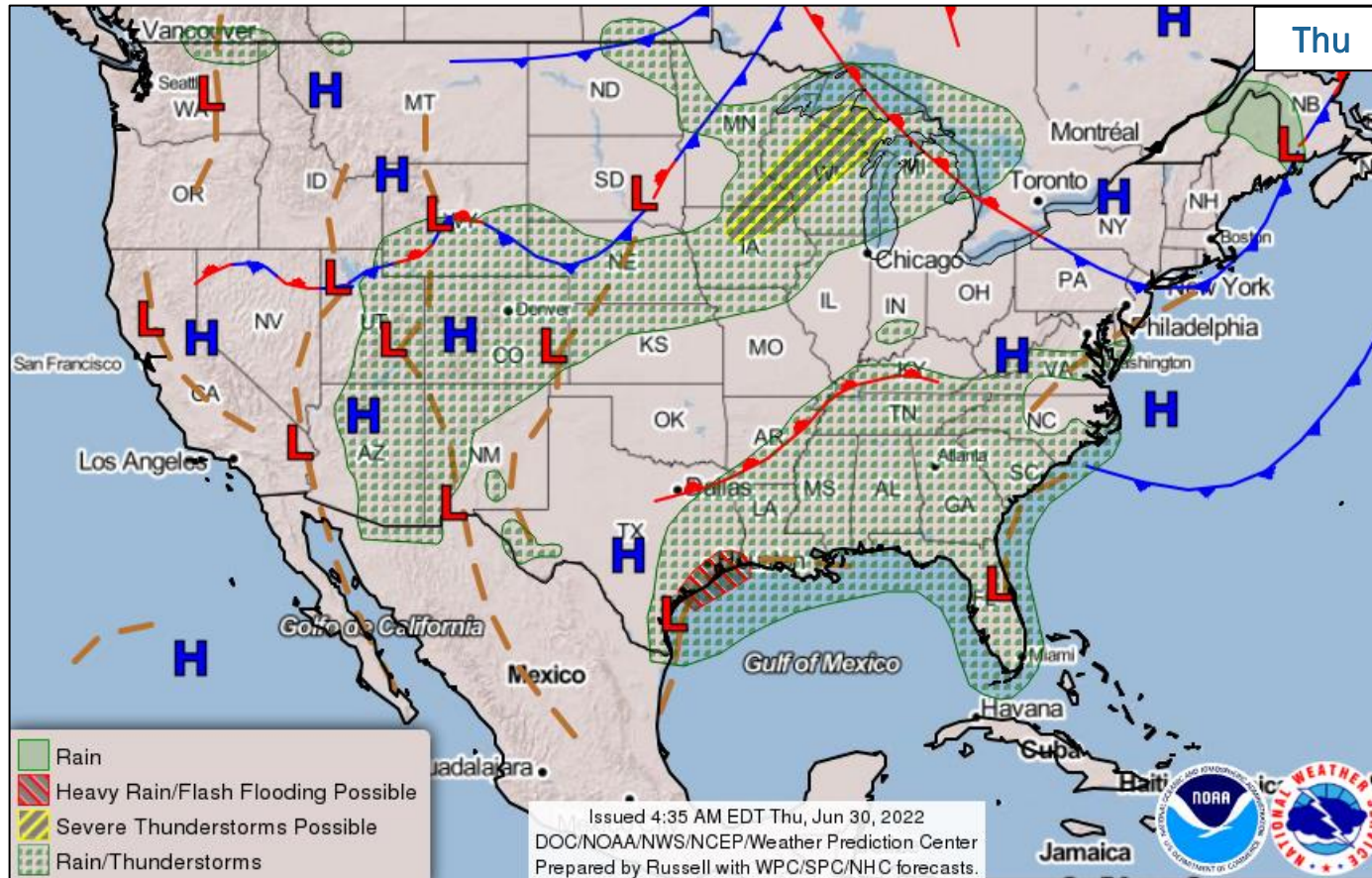
Disturbance 1 (as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Located **near the southern coast of Texas**
- Short-lived** TD could form near coast before turning NW and inland today
- Heavy rain** possible along Texas coast over next two days
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Med (**40%**); 5-day: Med (**40%**)

Disturbance 2 (as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Located **several** hundred miles E of Windward Islands
- Development is unlikely** due to unfavorable conditions
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (**10%**); 5-day: Low (**10%**)

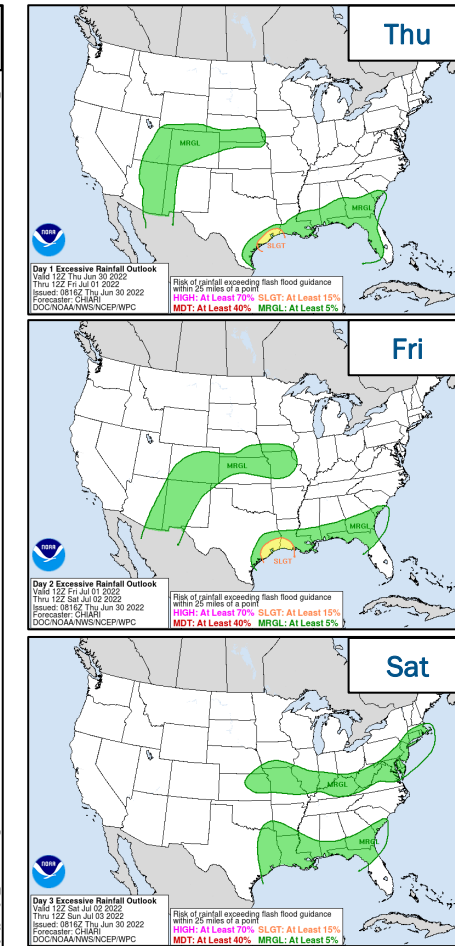
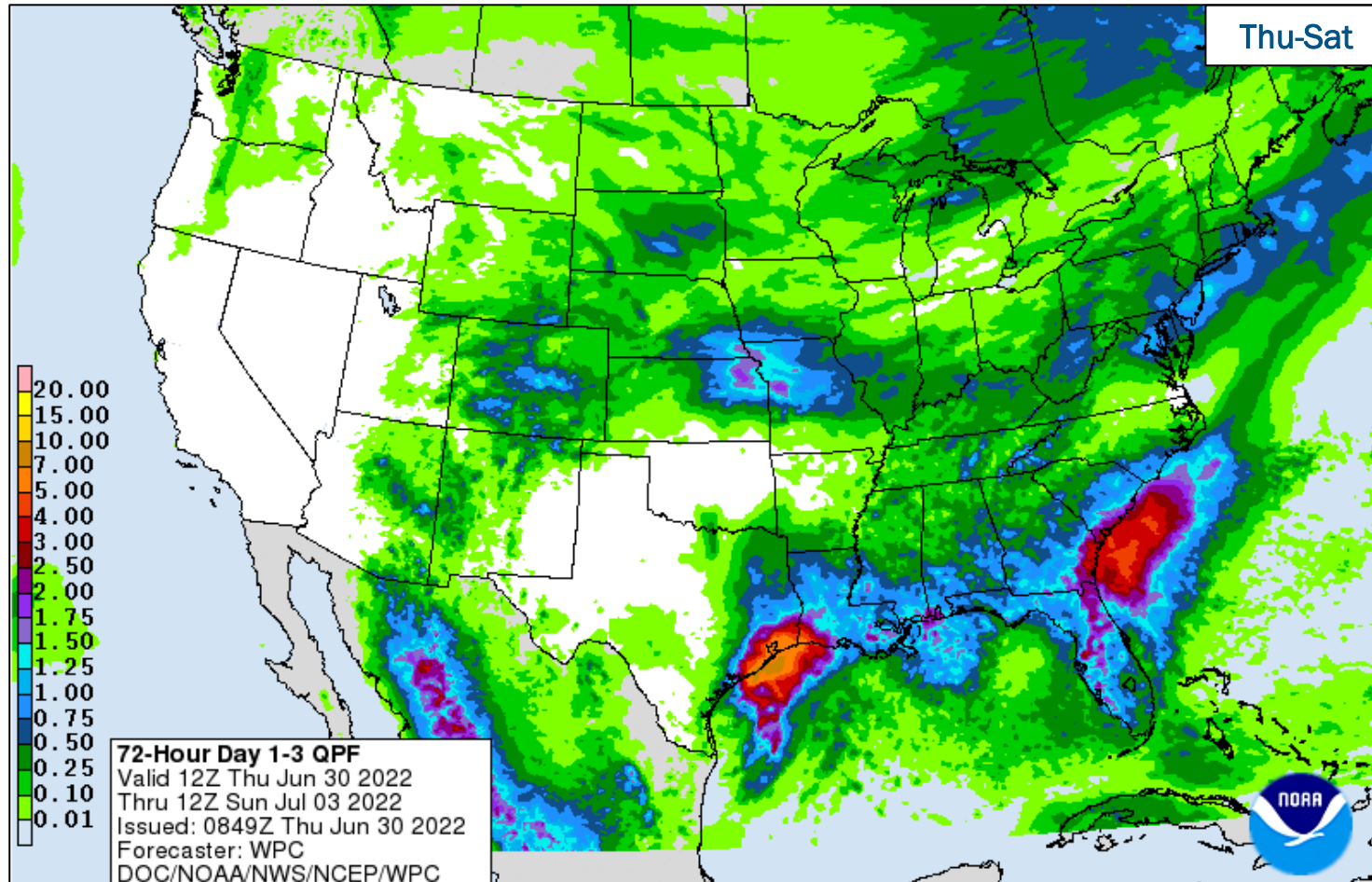
National Weather Forecast

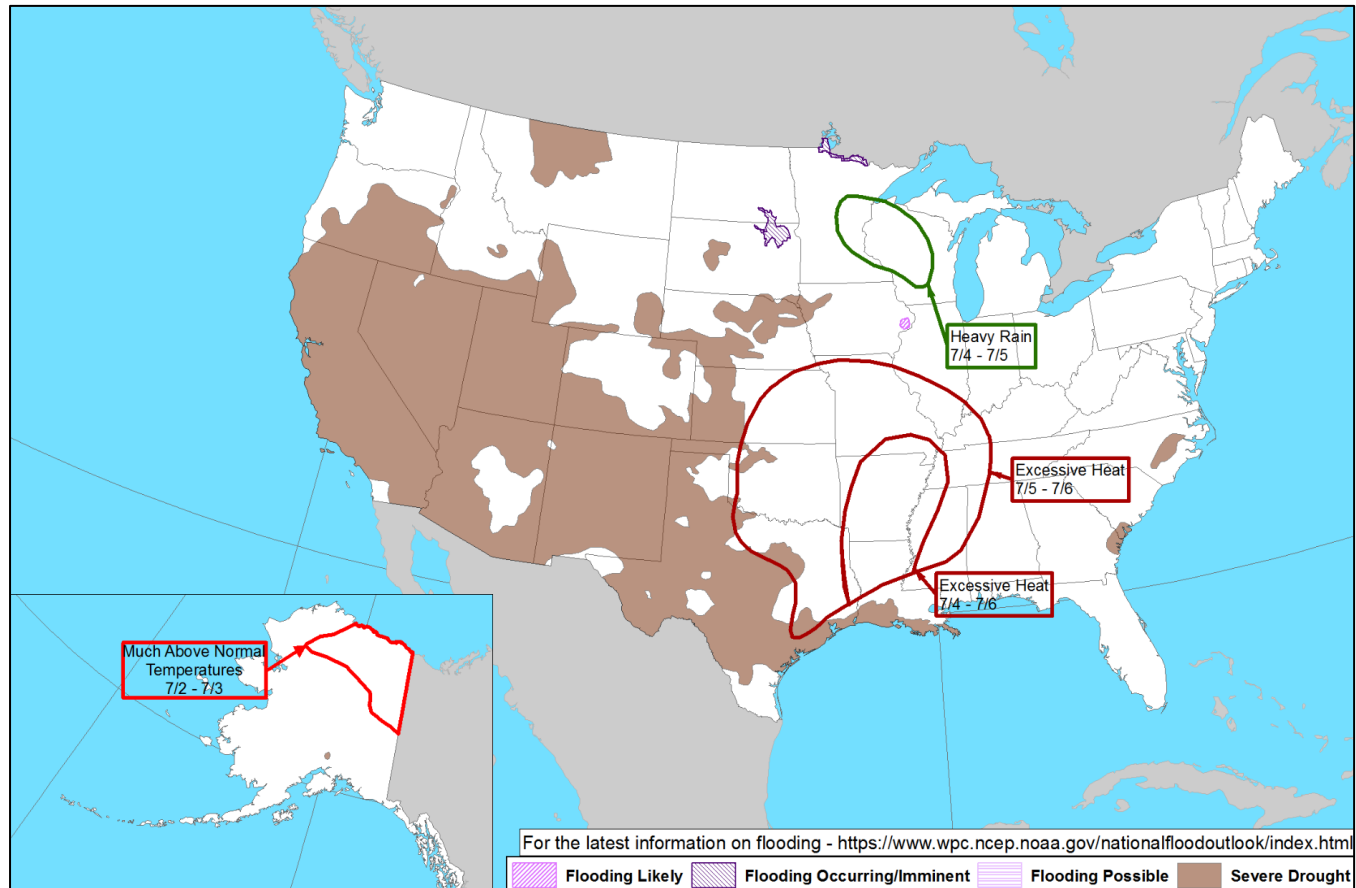
Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall

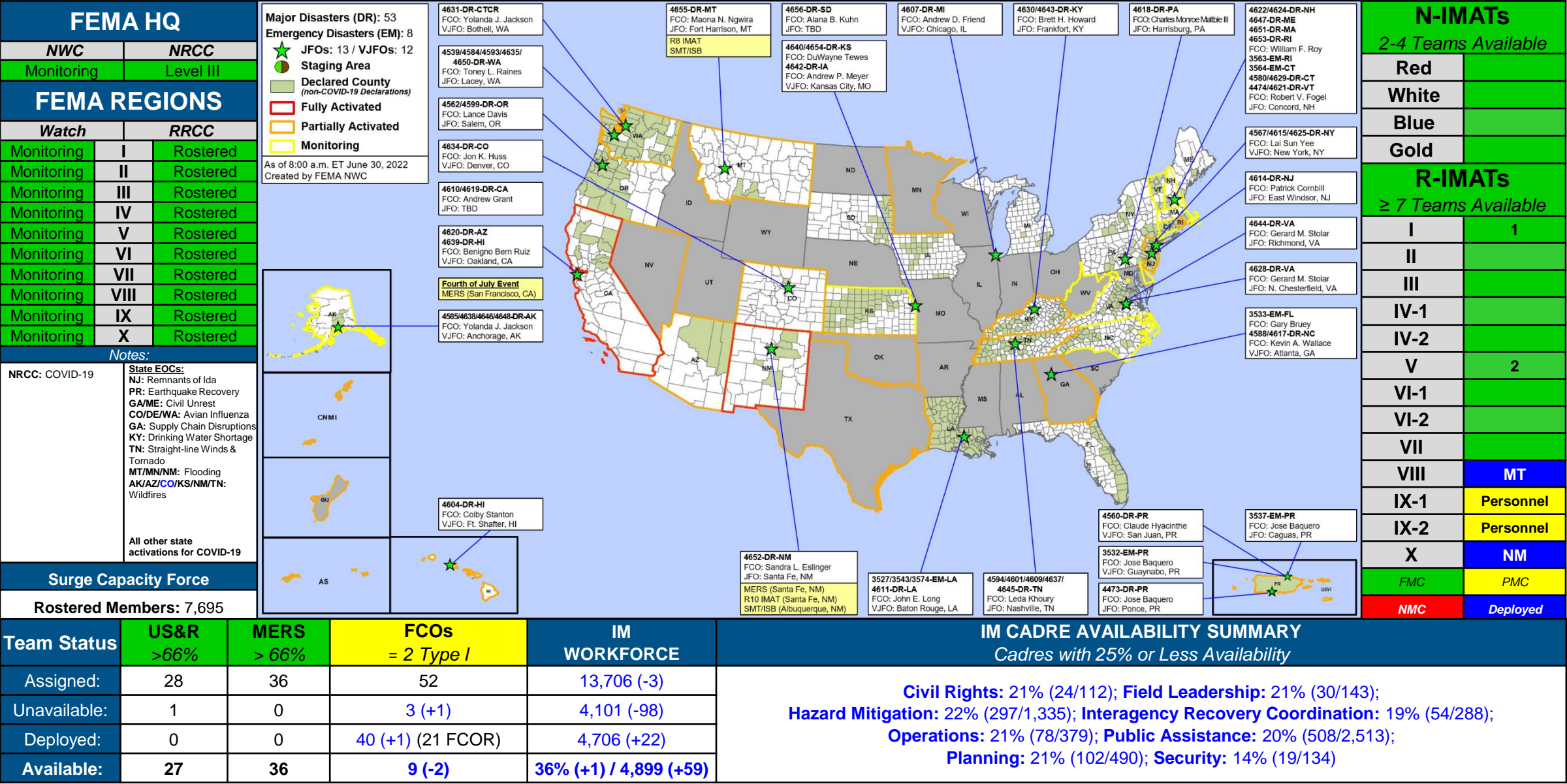

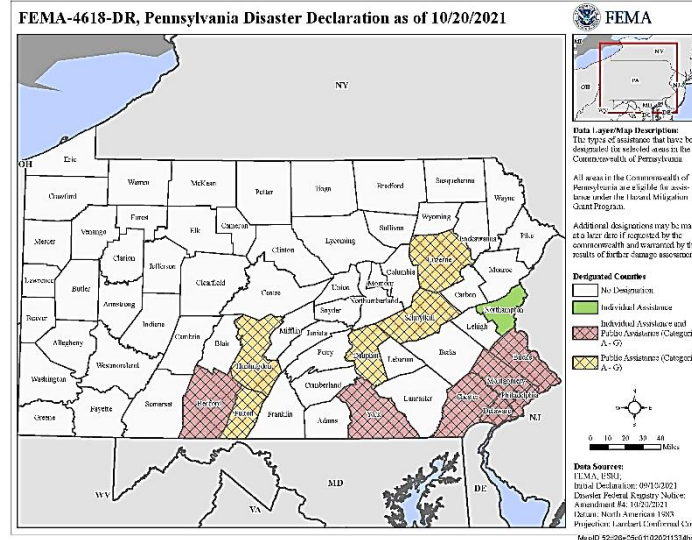

INCIDENT SUMMARY

A Major Disaster Declaration was approved for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania on September 10, 2021, designating eight (8) counties for Individual Assistance and the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program statewide. Three subsequent amendments added 12 counties for Public Assistance.

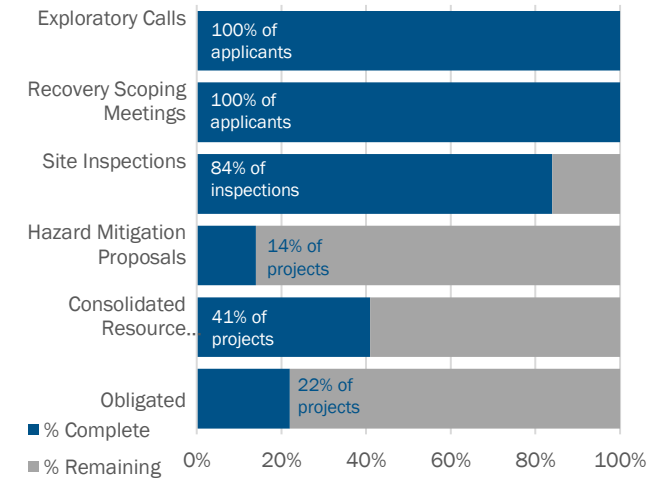

Housing	Housing: Adequate, resilient, accessible, and affordable housing	
	1	All survivors whose primary residences were damaged or destroyed or were displaced by the disaster have returned and re-established residence in permanent housing within the affected community
	2	Survivors can afford post-disaster permanent housing units within the affected community without post-disaster assistance
	3	Post-disaster permanent housing units in the affected community meet or exceed recognized residential codes and standards and incorporate recommended mitigation measures appropriate to the area's hazards (e.g., flooding, fire, high winds), or include resiliency measures
Economic	Economic: Sustainable, diversified and resilient economy	
	1	Business activities are resumed and restored, including those local and marginalized businesses and major employers
	2	Local and state government ability to facilitate and regulate business activities is restored
	3	Tax base and revenue streams from businesses are restored

	3	Access to raw material and other commodities that sustain the local economy has been restored
