


Tropical Outlook - Five Day


Hurricane Bonnie (CAT 1) (Advisory #39 as of 5:00 a.m. ET)

- 435 miles SSW of the southern tip of Baja California, Mexico, Mexico
- Moving WNW at 14 mph
- Maximum sustained winds 90 mph
- Expected to weaken below hurricane strength by Friday and become a post-tropical storm cyclone in a couple of days
- Hurricane-force-winds extend 10 miles
- Tropical-storm-force winds extend 70 miles

Disturbance 1 (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)


- Located several hundred miles S of the southern coast of Mexico




National Weather Forecast






Severe Weather Outlook








Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall



COMMUNITY PLANNING & CAPACITY BUILDING: Resilient recovery of SLTT communities

Outcome Indicator (C4): Mitigation and recovery projects have been implemented

- Opportunities were identified early resulting in 61% of current projects including 406
 Mitigation
- 43% of projects with mitigation funding have achieved resilience resulting in 2.6M in funding obligated to date (~18% under review)
- Mitigation Reviews have been quicker and more effective through forward-leaning PA Staff and strong CRC relationships
- Considerations for mitigation are being considered for all projects with work to be completed
- Strong partnerships with the State Hazard Mitigation Officer, coordination with R10 Mitigation Division, and field deployed staff for technical assistance and risk analysis is ongoing



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Recovery Outcomes

NATURAL & CULTURAL RESOURCES: Restored, modernized, hardened and resilient systems.

Outcome Indicator (N1): Natural resources in the affected community, to include socially marginalized, have been restored to protect people and ecosystems.

Outcome Indicator (N3): Access to raw material and other commodities that sustain the local economy has been restored.

- Impacted applicants are faced with short construction windows, rising costs for supplies, and access issues to multiple damaged sites in this event
- Facilitate development of measures and strategies to protect, preserve, conserve, rehabilitate, stabilize, and guide the recovery of natural and cultural resources and historic properties

Tenakee Springs Fish Ladder:

- Debris clearance and restoration will restore the fish pass structures natural function; allow salmon and other native species to access rearing habitats
- Local community relies on salmon returns for food supply and to boost the local economy through the commercial fishing industry
- Tenakee Springs and its neighboring communities are far removed from the established supply chain routes, residents utilize materials harvested from their natural environment to sustain the local economy and a subsistence lifestyle.
