


Tropical Outlook - Five Day

- Tropical-storm-force winds extend up to 45 miles

Disturbance 1 (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)


- Several hundred miles offshore of southern Mexico;

- Formation chance 48-hours: Low (10%) 5 day: Low (30%)





National Weather Forecast











Severe Weather Outlook





INCIDENT SUMMARY

Beginning April 5, 2022, and continuing New Mexico saw numerous wildfire starts. One month later, with 234,977 acres burned, fires continued to rage. With those fires, livestock perished, homes and businesses were destroyed. On May 4th the State of New Mexico requested and received a major disaster declaration for 5 counties, Colfax, Lincoln, Mora, San Miguel and Valencia for Individual Assistance, Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation statewide. In addition to the original Declaration, 5 (five) FRN updates/amendments have been issued.




