Spokane Co. Wildfires - Washington

Situation: Both FEMA RX and Washington State are in alignment on the current lifeline status as indicated on the slide. Lifelines continue to trend upward (turning green) indicating improving conditions. Northwest Interagency Coordination Center (NWCC) reports Gray fire as 48% (+23) contained and Oregon Rd. fire as 0% contained.

Lifelines Impacts: (Region X Report, as of 11:30 p.m. ET, Aug 23) Safety and Security:

- Approximately 21,178 (+28) total acres burned
- Residence threatened: 1,850 total, (850 Gray, 1,000 [+150] Oregon Road)
- Destroyed: 332 homes (240 [+55] Gray, 92 [+12] Oregon Road); 166 (+86) structures destroyed

Food, Hydration, and Shelter:

- Gray Fire all Level 3 "Go Now" orders have been lifted allowing the 4,000 displaced residents to return home. Level 2 – Be Ready remains in effect for a couple of areas
- Shelter pop (WA): 62 (-15); 3 (+1) shelters open (American Red Cross, as of 6:51 a.m. ET, Aug 24)
- Limited portions of Medical Lake still under boil water advisory.

Health and Medical:


- Air Quality Index is Good
- 2 confirmed fatalities

Energy:

 Seattle City Light (SCL) crews continue inspections; in progress getting last line re-energized. SCL is meeting their energy production quota.

Communications:

 Limited telecommunications due to impacted cell towers in the area surrounding the Gray Fire. T-Mobile on site providing support. WA Tech replacing primary fiber for the Eastern State Hospital



Transportation:

- SR 902, 904, 20, and I-90 are Open
- 1 rail bridge damaged, workaround in place

Hazardous Material:

 Increased risk of HAZMAT within affected areas due to the fuels being burned across the country

- WA at Full Activation (Fire Season) w/ ESFs 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, and 20
- Governor declared a SOE

- FMAGs approved Aug 19

- FEMA LNO is deployed to State EOC

Wildfires - Hawaii



<u>Current Situation:</u> FEMA and federal partners continue to support the state of Hawaii in response and recovery efforts from Hawaii Wildfires. Mission priorities remain focused on Search & Rescue, fire containment, and damage assessments in the impacted area (Maui County). The second Disaster Recovery Center (DRC #2) is scheduled to soft open on today) and fully open on Fri. (8/25). Cellular service continues to improve in West Maui.

<u>Lifelines Impacts:</u> (FEMA-DR-4724-HI-SLB #14 as of 1:41 a.m. ET, Aug 24) **Safety and Security:**

- USAR continue to conduct secondary low searches and secondary high searches
- More than 600 displaced students have re-enrolled in other public schools
- 159 FLEOs from various agencies supporting Maui PD

Food, Hydration, and Shelter:

- Non-Congregate Shelters Open: 11 (+1); midnight count: 2,729 (+342)
- Hotel Survivor Population: 2,870
- TSA: 141 (+9) people housed in 8 hotels

Health and Medical:


- 115 confirmed fatalities; 67 fire-related injuries
- Kula Hospital water shut off and using back up water supply for 9 days

Water Systems:

- Final generator installed 8/22 at water system booster pump site
- Awaiting water resampling for contaminants at West Maui sites

Energy:

- 1,869 (-31) customers remain without power in Maui
- Power restoration: West Maui (areas that can be accessed) Aug 20-26; central Maui (Alaluana above Olinda) – 8/27
- USACE: Temporary Power team and contractor will be conducting a site assessment for installation of generators to power EPA staging area in Central Maui



Communications: (Maui County)

- Telecommunications provider has begun working to restore services in Kaanapali area, north of Lahaina
- 4 of 21 cell sites have been restored to permanent fiber service in West Maui

Transportation:

- 3 Temporary Flight Restrictions (TFR) in effect for Maui County
- Access limited for Honoapi'ilani and Lahaina Bypass Roads: open to the public during the day and evening; limited to residents and first responders overnight
- FEMA contractors providing universal communication and prior permission required (PPR) services at Kapalua Airport until 8/30




Tropical Outlook - Seven Day


Disturbance 1 (EP91) (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Located several hundred miles off coast of southern Mexico
- Moving N to NW
- Conditions appear favorable for gradual development, a tropical depression is likely to form the next two to three days
- Formation chance 48-hour: Med (50%); 7-day: High (80%)

Disturbance 2 (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Located well S of the southern tip of Baja California, Mexico
- Moving WNW
- Conditions appear favorable for gradual development, a tropical depression could form in the next few days
- Formation chance 48-hour: Medium (50%); 7-day: High (70%)

Tropical Storm Franklin (Advisory #15, as of 5:00 a.m. ET)

Disturbance 1 (Remnants of Emily) (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Located 1.000 miles ESE of Bermuda
- This system could regenerate into a tropical storm by Friday
- Formation chance 48-hour: High (70%); 7-day: High (70%)

Disturbance 2 (AL92) (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Located several hundred miles W of the Cabo Verde Islands
- Slow development is possible and the low could become a tropical depression by the weekend
- Formation chance 48-hour: Low (20%); 7-day: Medium (40%)

<u>Disturbance 3</u> (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)


- Located along the East Pacific coast of Central America
- A tropical depression could form while it moves across the Gulf of Mexico
- Formation chance 48-hour: Low (10%); 7-day: Medium (50%)



Tropical Storm Franklin- Atlantic

Situation (Advisory #15 as of 5:00 a.m. ET)

- Located 55 miles ENE of Grand Turk Island
- Maximum sustained winds 50 mph
- Moving N at 13 mph
- Tropical-storm-force winds extend outward at 105 miles
- Franklin will continue to move farther away from the Dominican Republic and over the southwestern Atlantic into the weekend






Tropical Depression 08W - Western Pacific

Situation (Warning #06 as of 5:00 a.m. ET)

- Located 328 miles ENE of Anderson AFB
- Maximum sustained winds 30 mph
- Moving WNW at 12 mph
- Further intensification to a high-end tropical storm expected as it moves away from the Mariana Islands
- 08W is not forecast to directly impact the Marianas


FEMA continues to prepare for response and recovery efforts focusing on FEMA Regions II, IV, and VI. The National Hurricane Center is monitoring several tropical disturbances in the Atlantic that may pose a threat to US interests over the next several days



<u>Situation:</u> The fire began on August 22, 2023 and is burning on state and private land in and around the communities of Merryville and Singer, LA (combined population 1,244). 10,000 of acres burned; 60% contained. 500 of homes threatened within 3 miles of the fire. The fire has destroyed 70 primary homes and 10 secondary homes. Mandatory evacuations in effect for 50 people and voluntary evacuations are in effect for approximately 492 people.



<u>Situation:</u> The fire began on August 23, 2023, and is burning on private land in and around the communities of Liberty, South Salem, and Salem Hills (combined population 1,500). 40 acres burned; 0% contained. 700 to 1,200 of homes threatened around the community consisting of primary homes. The fire is also threatening buildings, roads and bridges, public power infrastructure and utilities in the area. Mandatory evacuations in effect for 200 households. In addition, there are 3 other large fires burning uncontrolled within the State.
