Flooding & Tornadoes – Central U.S.



Current Situation:

Major flood levels expected to continue across the Midwest and Great Lakes regions for weeks. Forecast crests on portions of the Mississippi River expected to be in the top five highest on record; portions of the Illinois River forecast to reach near record to record flood levels.

Open source media reported a levee breach at North Little Rock, AR. The primary levee in North Little Rock is NOT in immediate danger; a containment berm was breached at a petroleum facility. NWS issued a Flash Flood Warning as a precaution, which was lifted shortly thereafter.


Lifeline Impacts:

Safety and Security

- LA: USACE delayed the opening of at the Morganza Control Structure (single bay) to June 6; USACE plans to open additional bays by June 9
- IL: Several levees are forecast to overtop in Scott and Greene counties in primarily agricultural areas; USACE teams are working with local officials

Food, Water & Sheltering:

- 24 shelters open with 426 (+11) (occupants (ARC Shelter report June 1)
 - o OK: 7 (-1) / 122 (-14); KS: 1 (-1) / 12 (+6); MO: 6 (1+) / 71 (-4)
 - o OH: 5 /111 (+2); AR: 5 (+2) / 110 (+21)
- Evacuations:
 - AR: Mandatory for portions of Jefferson County along the Arkansas River due to record flooding;
 voluntary remain in effect for 11 counties
 - o IL: Voluntary for portions of the City of Columbia (Monroe County)
 - o MO: Mandatory for West Quincy (industrial area) due to levee breach
 - KS: Independence (pop 9,483) and Coffeyville (pop 10,295) due to Verdigris River flooding; Reno County may evacuate approx. 200 people due to water and sewage issues cause by flooding
 - o OK: Voluntary remain in effect for 11 counties; mandatory for 1 community (Webber Falls; pop. 600)

Lifeline Impacts (Continued):

Health & Medical

- OH: 1 fatality and 7 injuries
- OK: 6 fatalities and numerous injuries
- KS: 2 fatalities; 44 injuries
- MO: 10 fatalities; 20 injuries
- AR: Yell County Local Health Units have closed as a precautionary action and Franklin County Local Health Units are operating at limited capacity

Transportation

- Roads: Numerous roads remain closed; alternate routes available
- Waterways:
 - o USCG closed portions of the Mississippi and Illinois Rivers due to high-water levels
 - o Commercial navigation remains shut down along the Arkansas River
- Rail:
 - o Amtrak between Kansas City, KS to St. Louis & St. Louis and Fort Worth suspended
 - Union Pacific between Chicago and San Antonio via Little Rock and Dallas suspended
 - Track damage north of West Quincy, MO due to levee breach; impacts to BNSF (agricultural cargo), alternate tracks in other areas available, will cause track congestion and slow cargo movement

Hazardous Materials

 OK: 65 wastewater plants are having ongoing issues, most of which are bypasses; 4 communities have wastewater plants shut down









Precipitation Forecast

















Fire Weather Outlook








