



Upper Mississippi – River Forecast




- Rivers across the upper mainstem Mississippi River and Ohio River will continue to fall over the next 2-3 days
 - Heavy rain expected over the weekend into early next week
 - May bring renewed rises across the Missouri and Ohio River Valleys, which could cause new rises on rivers
- Although river stages are falling, Moderate to Major Flooding continues along the mainstem Mississippi River, Illinois River, and many tributaries
- Levels along the Missouri River continue to recede;
 Moderate to Major flooding continues at many locations
- The Mississippi River crest is approaching the confluence with the Ohio River; Cairo, IL on the Ohio River is expected to crest tomorrow at 49 FT



Lower Mississippi – River Forecast




- The Lower Mississippi River continues to rise from its confluence with the Ohio River downstream to Greenville, MS
 - Additional rises of 1-2 feet are forecast
- The Arkansas River crest has reached the Mississippi River
 - All points along the Arkansas River are forecast to fall below Major Flood over the next 24 hours
- Major flooding is occurring at Natchez, MS and Vicksburg, MS
 - Impacts are primarily to agriculture. Navigation impacts continue at Baton Rouge, LA
- Heavy rain forecast over the weekend may bring new rises along area tributaries and the Arkansas River
- Elevated levels will continue through June and well into July along the Lower Mississippi River




National Weather Forecast
