Situation:

Major flood levels expected to continue across the Midwest and Gulf Coast regions for weeks; the Mississippi River is slowly rising and will crest next week. Recent heavy rainfall caused quick rises to rivers in southeast TX, AR, and LA, but significant additional rain is not expected in the Middle Mississippi and Arkansas River Basin areas over the weekend.







National Weather Forecast










Precipitation Forecast











6-10 Day Temperature Probability




6-10 Day Precipitation Probability




