Flooding – South Central U.S.

Severe Weather and Flooding – Southern Plains to Lower Mississippi Valley

- Heavy rainfall caused widespread moderate to major flooding in south-central U.S.
- Some areas have crested but other areas will experience long-duration crests into next week
- · Lower Sabine, Bayou Dorcheat, Little River of Louisiana and Pearl River at record or near record flooding
- Another storm system will track across the region late today through Friday, bringing ½ 2 inches of rainfall on average; this should not significantly impact the ongoing river flooding but could delay the rate of recession

Louisiana

- EOC at Monitoring (Level III)
- Flooding is occurring in homes along Pearl River; unknown number of evacuations
- A spoil bank (a berm created from channel dredging), rather than a levee near LaFourche Canal, has overtopped; 675
 evacuated in Richland Parish
- Boil water advisories lifted from 20 public water systems; 54 public water systems remain on boil water advisories
- · 4 confirmed fatalities
- 2,060 customers without power (peak 42k) (Eagle -1,7:00 am EDT, March 16)
- 28k residents evacuated statewide (LA SITREP)
- 16 shelters open with 203 occupants (ARC midnight shelter count, 7:00 am EDT, March 16)

<u>Texas</u>

- EOC increased to Partial Activation (Level II)
- Governor issued Emergency Proclamation for 17 counties
- IH-10 along Sabine River in Orange County (southeast TX) closed between TX & LA border; evacuations in effect
- · City of Deweyville cut off by floodwater
- · Mandatory evacuations for Orange County
- 4 injuries, 1 missing
- 340 customers without power (peak 7,741) (Eagle -I,7:00 am EDT, March 16)
- 8 shelters open with 144 occupants (ARC midnight shelter count, 7:00 am EDT, March 16)






Precipitation Forecast, 1-3 Day
















Fire Weather Outlook




