- Majority of rivers in eastern TX, southern AR and MS have crested or will crest soon, but major river flooding will continue
 into next week for parts of LA, especially on Lower Sabine, Ouachita, Boeuf and Red Rivers
- Another storm system is bringing additional rainfall (1-4 inches) to the coastal region through Saturday but should not significantly impact the river flood situation other than delaying rate of recession
