Current Situation

- Severe thunderstorms and recent heavy rainfall (10 to 18 inches) continues to cause flooding across the central and southern Great Plains
- Localized flash flooding possible today; many rivers expected to remain above flood stage into next week

Impacts

- Minimal power outages remain across TX
- 4,561 homes identified as impacted (number expected to increase)
- Four water treatment plants have boil water notices in effect
 - One wastewater plant in Katy, TX (pop. 14k) is inaccessible, but functioning (full assessment of facility expected later today)
- Road conditions improving, though some remain impassible (I-10 frontage roads closed in Houston area)
- 8 (-4) American Red Cross shelters remain open with 327 (+67) occupants (ARC Shelter Report 6:00 am)
- Nine confirmed fatalities; no reports of injuries
- · Assessments ongoing


Precipitation Forecast, 1-3 Day




