3 Bring loose outdoor items such as patio furniture inside. They can blow around and cause damage to homes.



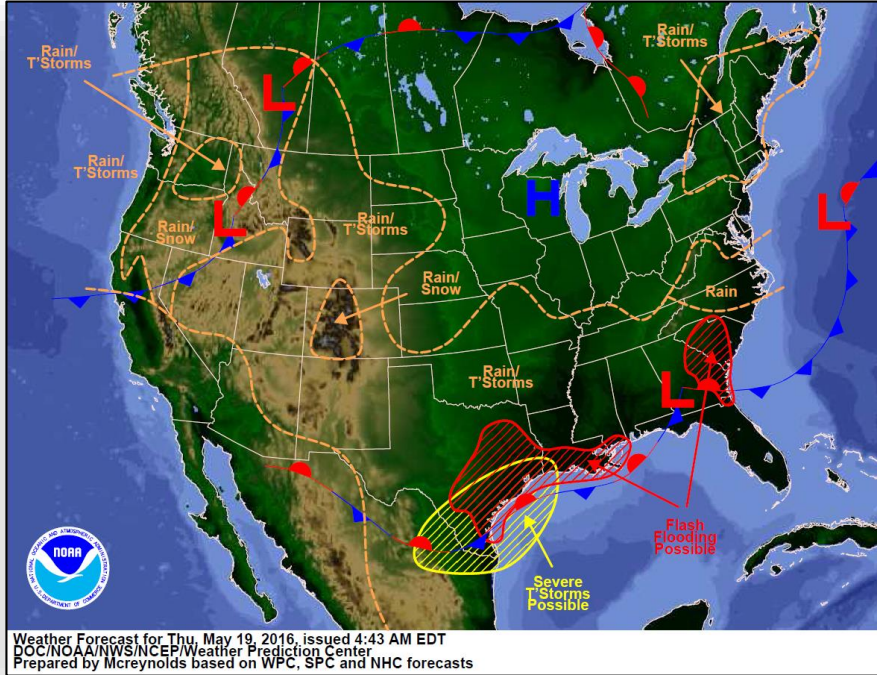
4 Secure all doors on your property. Remember that the garage door is usually the most vulnerable.



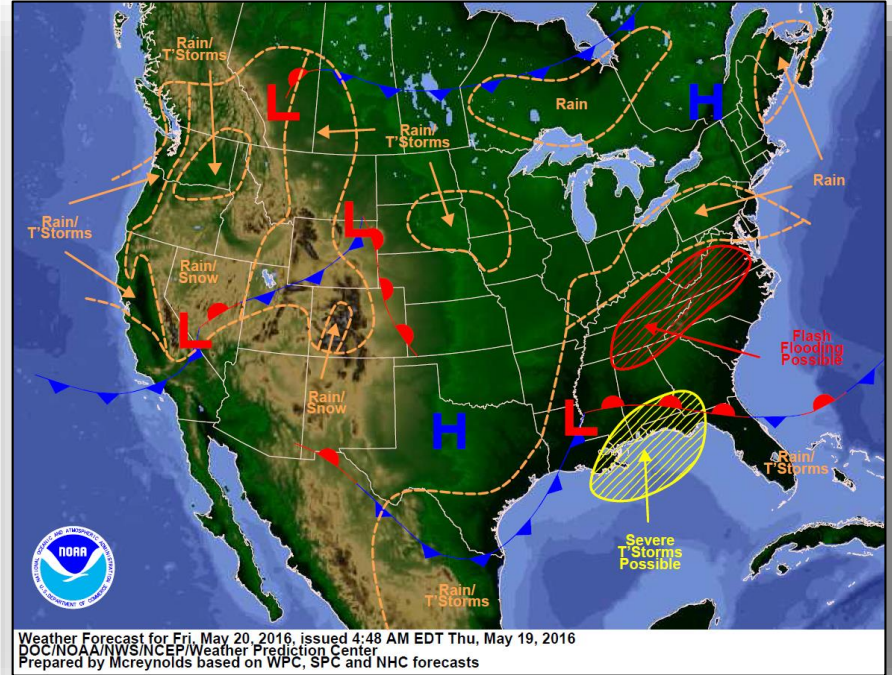

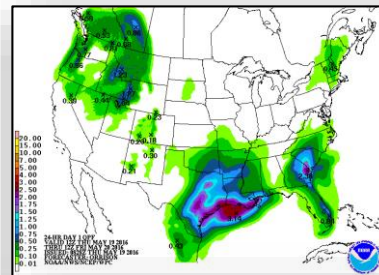
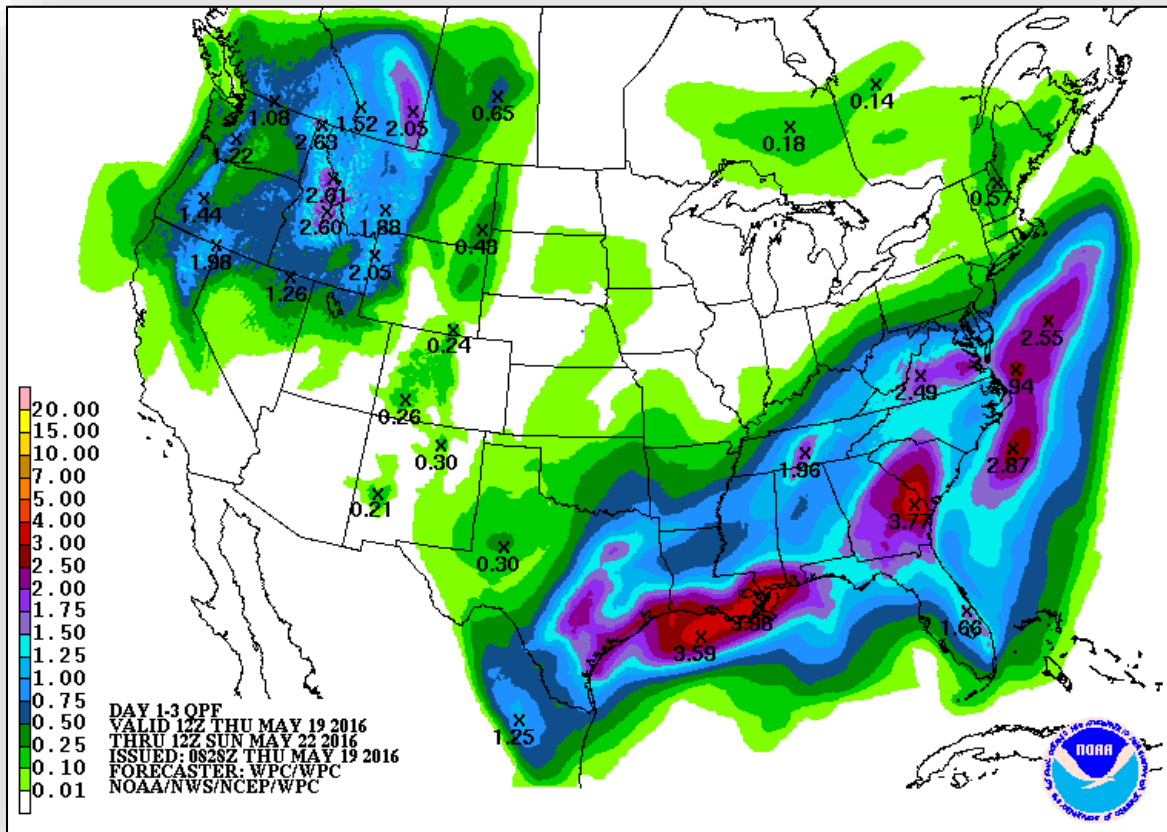
Severe Weather Outlook: Days 1-3



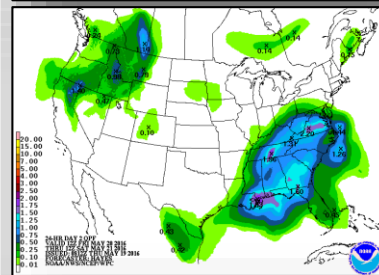
Precipitation Forecast, 1-3 Day



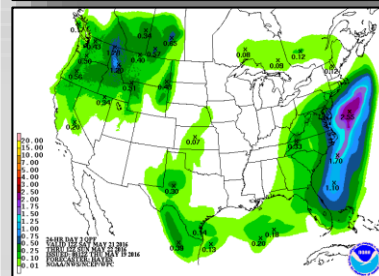

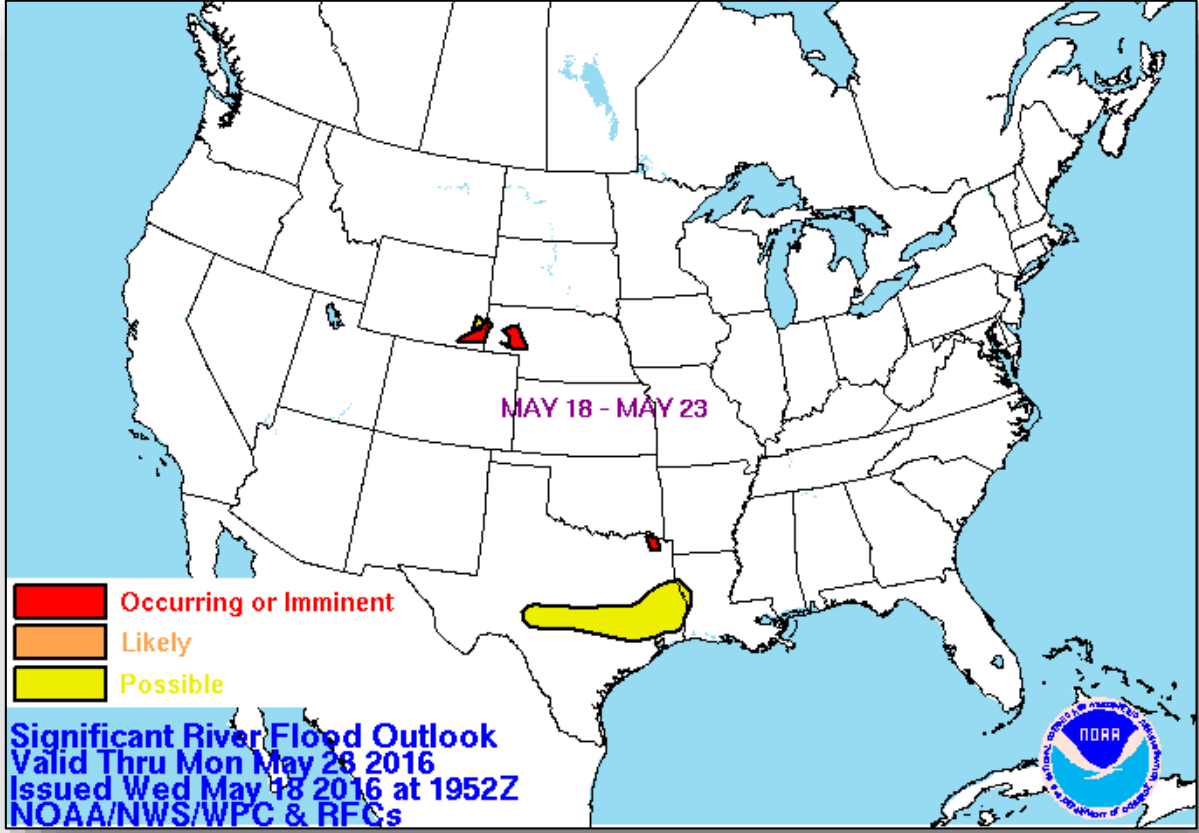

Significant River Flood Outlook



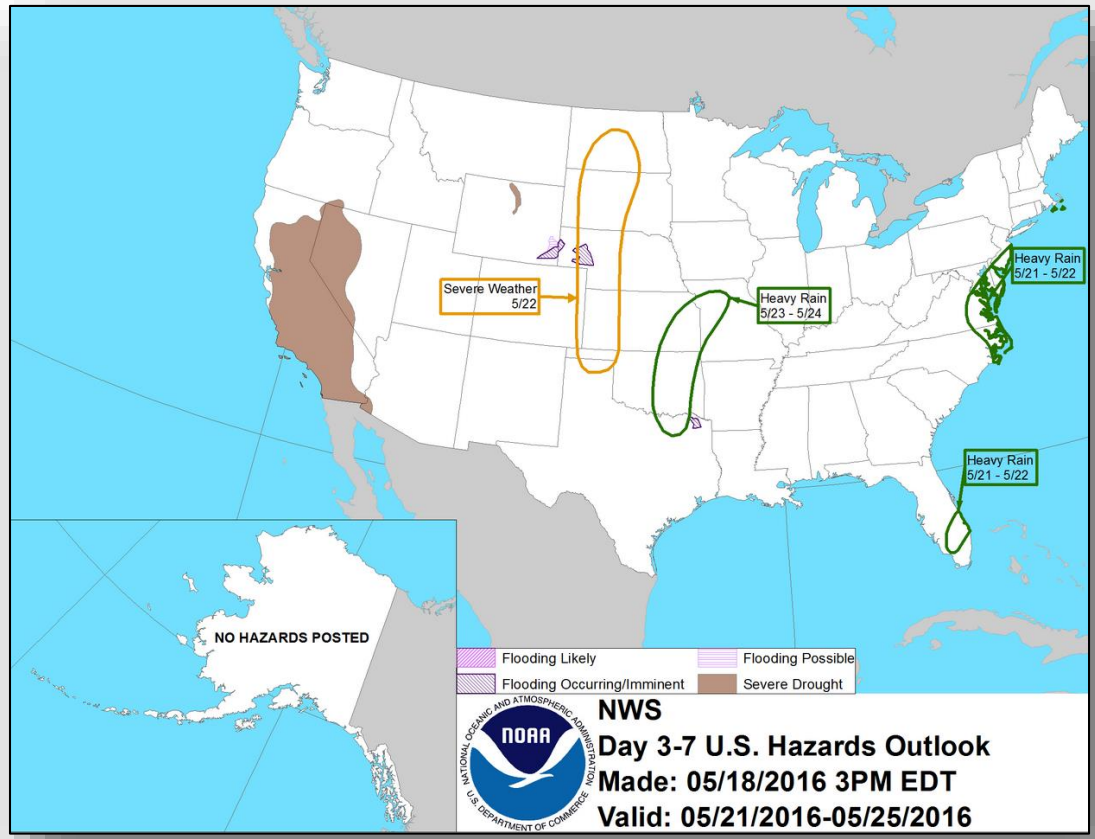

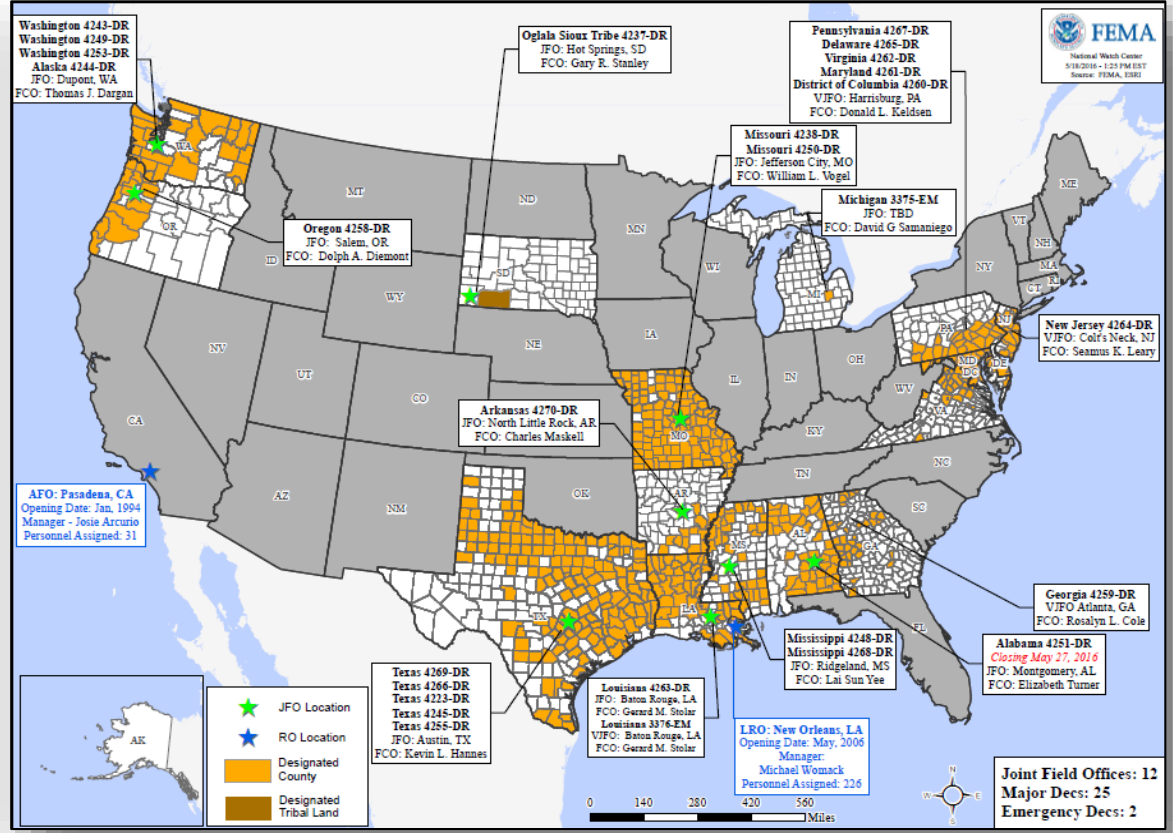

State Priorities:

- a) Public messaging.

- d) Temporary sheltering and long-term housing of displaced population.
- e) Continued Preliminary Damage Assessments (PDAs).
- f) Ensure the safety of all incident personnel.

Joint Objectives:

1. Provide timely, effective and accessible unified messaging to disaster survivors, affected communities and public officials as required.
- 2b. Provide timely, effective and accessible information and disaster assistance in all IA designated counties.
5. Deliver an inclusive Individual Assistance program to eligible survivors through Housing Assistance and Other Needs Assistance programs to the whole of community.
- 6a. Conduct Joint Public Assistance PDAs in counties not designated under FEMA-4268-DR-MS as required.
8. Coordinate with Voluntary Agencies to identify and alleviate individual and community unmet needs.
9. Administer the Public Assistance program in compliance with all applicable authorities, laws and policies.

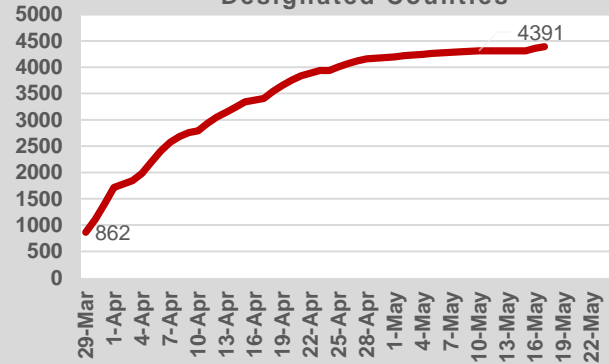

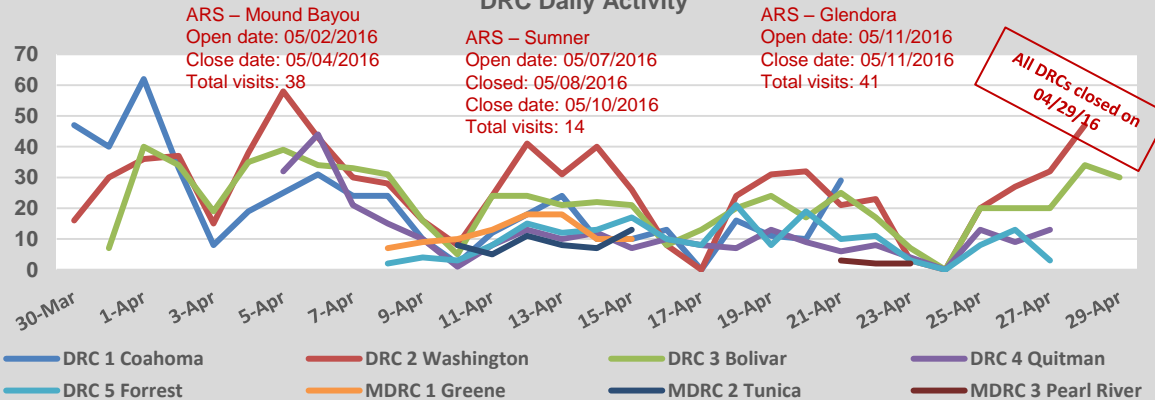

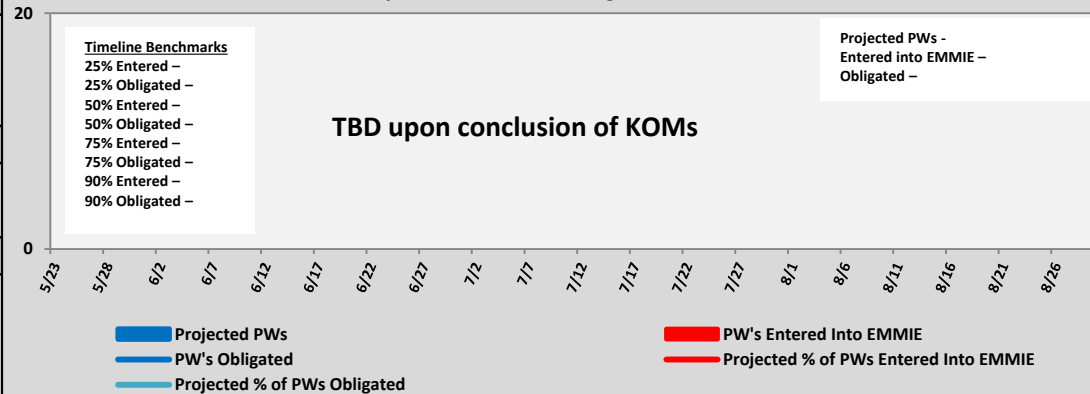

Project Worksheet Strategic Timeline



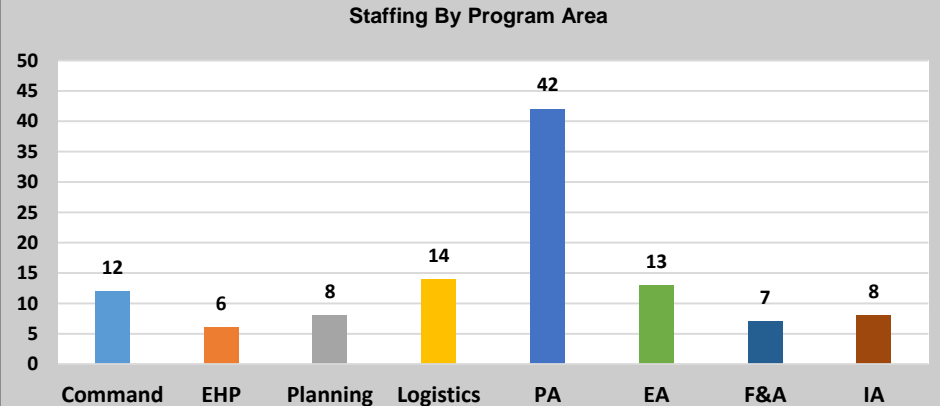
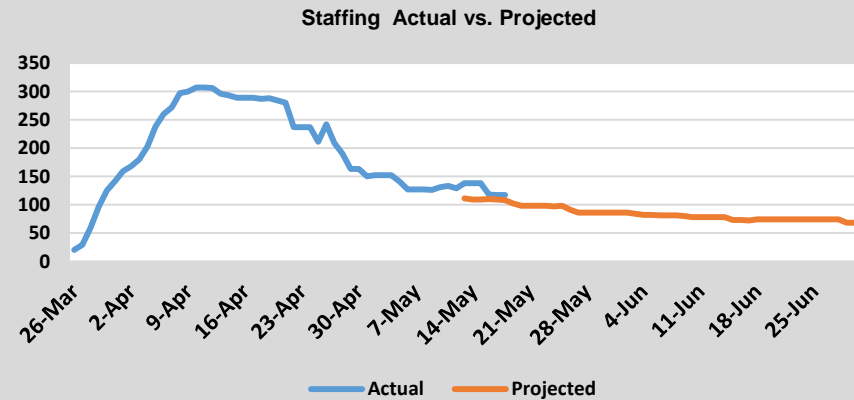
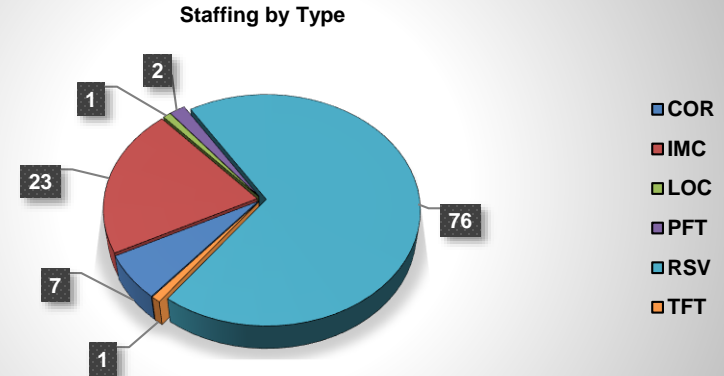
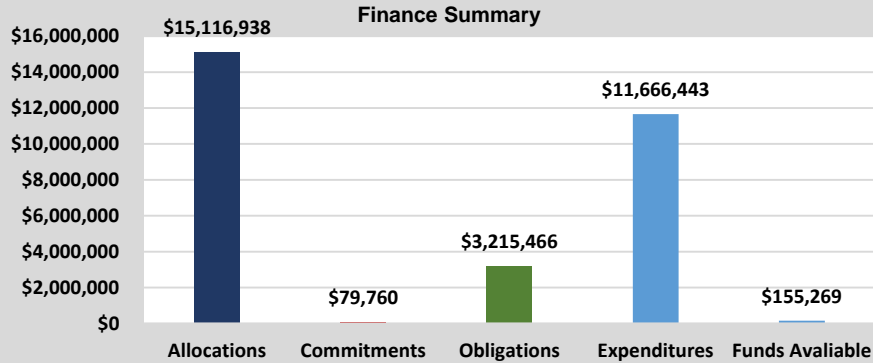
