




Hurricane Matthew (CAT 3) (Advisory #33A as of 8:00 a.m. EDT)

- Located 215 miles SE of West Palm Beach, FL; moving NW at 12 mph
   Expected near E coast of FL tomorrow night
- Maximum sustained winds 125 mph; Hurricane-Force Winds extend 40 miles; Tropical-Storm-Force winds extend 160 miles
- · Strengthening expected today; forecast to be a CAT 4 as it approaches FL
- · Hurricane Warnings from Golden Beach, FL to Altamaha, GA
- Hurricane Watch from Altamaha, GA to South Santee River, SC
- Tropical Storm Warning for much of the southern tip of FL

#### Hazards Affecting Land


- Combination of dangerous storm surge and tide will cause normally dry areas near the coast to be flooded
- Danger of life-threatening inundation during the next 36 hours along FL east coast from Deerfield Beach to Altamaha Sound
- Powerful swells causing life-threatening surf and rip current conditions expected for FL east coast



# Rainfall Forecast – Day 1-3



- Matthew expected to produce total rainfall of 4 to 8 inches with isolated amounts up to 12 inches along coastal eastern FL, mainly today and Friday
- Heavy rain is expected to move north into coastal GA and SC, possibly NC, Friday into the weekend
- SC currently the most vulnerable for freshwater flooding due to the recent heavy rain event



# Tropical Outlook – Atlantic


Tropical Storm Nicole: (Advisory 8, as of 5:00 a.m. EDT)

- Formation chance through 5 days: Low (10%)


